

BUILDING PERMITS. Building permits covering construction dollars have been issued in the city during the six months which ended wedweckly. The cost of the work for which permits have been issued since the first of the year totals \$25,350, as compared with \$90,000 for the same ceriad in 1919. During June, this year, the total cost of work for which permits have been seared is \$213,000, as compared with \$9,500 for June, has year, and includes the construction of a concrete founda-tion and floor for the sugar warehouse of the Atlastic Sugar Refineries, which with amount to \$200,000.
