

Labor Federation Paris Resolution

Unemployment Question Receives Discussion—District Vice President Named.

The New Brunswick Federation of Labor opened its first session at 8.30 a.m. yesterday, President Tigue in the chair. The following were elected district vice-presidents: Westmorland—Wm. J. McNeil, Campbellton; Northumberland—E. A. Kirby, Chatham; Westmorland—H. H. Stuart, Sunny Brae; Moncton—J. A. Godfrey, 30 Pine St., Moncton; St. John City and County—John McNeil, Fairbairn; Miramichi—H. S. Smith, Milltown; Surobry—Frank G. Vandenberg, Miramichi; York—Harry W. Gillies, McAdam; Carleton—A. G. McGibbon, Woodstock.

F. A. Campbell was elected Legislative Lobbyist. Ex-president C. A. Melanson, Lobbyist for last two years, declined re-nomination.

Unemployment

The committee on unemployment reported the following resolution: "We call upon our Federal, Provincial and Civic Governments to have the matter of unemployment investigated with the view of having a comprehensive system made effective; and

Be it further resolved that owing to the time that will be required to have said investigation made, that this N. B. F. of Labor would urge upon the aforesaid Governments, as well as the employers of labor to do their utmost in promoting employment whenever possible; and

Be it further resolved, that copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Federal and Provincial Governments, Executive of the Trades Congress of Canada and the Minister of Labor, and also given out to the press.

Union Label

W. R. Rogers submitted report on Union Label. It urged all union men to demand the union label on everything purchased by them, and that future delegates attending the convention be requested to have at least two union labels on their wearing apparel; also that each central labor body be requested to take the matter up with all local unions with a view of having the matter of our membership purchase union-made goods.

A resolution in favor of forbidding one-man street railway cars was adopted.

The Federation went on record as opposing the selling by the N. B. Electric Commission of power to private persons or concerns for distribution for profit.

They believe minors under eighteen years of age should not be permitted to drive motor vehicles.

3. Sec. (a) Against railway shopmen doing outside work belonging to carpenters, etc., and Sec. (b) Requesting building organizations to sign agreement to stand by each other, were referred back to Moncton Building Trades for local action; Sec. (c), asking lowering of cost of living in Moncton; (d), asking for a P. of L. organizer for said trades; Sec. (e), that employers be held responsible for taxes of non-resident labor; Concluded in. And Sec. (f) For next convention to meet in Moncton; referred to convention. Whole of No. 4, as read, was adopted.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session opened at 2.30, with J. E. Tigue presiding. Credentials were received from International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Employers and Moving Picture Machine Operators, No. 440, St. John, Jack Rowley, delegate.

Resolutions

Resolution No. 17, from Newcastle I. L. A., favoring Government ownership of alcohol and alcoholic compounds and a referendum on importation received the same fate as St. John I. L. A., No. 373's resolution in favor of seven per cent. beer-overwhelming defeat.

Ways and Means committee recommended grant to reporter. Adopted.

Votes of Thanks

The committee on thanks reported as follows:—"That the thanks of this convention be extended to Mayor Schofield for his interesting address and valuable suggestions at the opening of this convention; also to R. T. Hayes, M.P.P., representing Premier Foster and the N. B. Government, for his address. "That this convention is under a debt of gratitude to Commissioner J. I. Surrao for his able and instructive address on the Workmen's Compensation Act. "That F. G. Spencer be thanked for loan of Motion Picture outfit to entertainment committee. "That thanks are also due to Major Oland and Joseph O'Brien for their attendance as guests at our banquet. "That a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to the executive of the Trades and Labor Council of St. John for the magnificent banquet and entertainment at the Prince William Hotel for our benefit. "That we also feel that the success of this convention is due to the officers for the efficient and able way they have conducted the business of the N. B. Federation of Labor for the past year."

Resolutions

Resolution 1. Amended to make the closing paragraph read: "That all persons operating cars in this province must pass necessary examinations for qualification and obtain certificates of competence, and that arrangements be made by the Provincial Government with the different cities, towns or localities, whereby such certificates may be obtained without additional cost to applicants. Adopted by convention.

Motor Freight Lines To Haul Farm Goods

New Delaware Co. to Operate Fifty Trucks—Will Carry Passengers as Well.

Burlington, Del., Jan. 13.—To combat high railroad freight rates to points in lower Delaware, and to insure speedy transportation of farm products to Wilmington and Philadelphia, a new corporation, with an authorized capital of \$500,000, has been formed. It will be known as the Wilmington and Suburban Transportation Corporation, with main offices in Wilmington. It is expected to be in full operation by March 15. Fifty motor trucks will be operated on two routes. One route will take in all the towns between Philadelphia, Wilmington and Delmar, while the other will start from this city, taking in Frederick, Milford, Georgetown and Millsboro, terminating at Seelyville. The corporation plans to operate passenger bus service during the summer between Wilmington and Seelyville. Passenger service will also be maintained between Wilmington and West Chester, Avondale and Kennett Square, Pa.

"Whereas those with large families are discriminated against, and find it difficult to obtain suitable dwellings, we are strongly of the opinion that legislation be enacted that would prevent landlords from discriminating against persons with families. Concluded in. Adopted by convention.

Resolution 24.—From Minto Miners asking that mine operators install fans for ventilating, and that scales be installed for weighing coal, etc. Concluded in. Adopted by convention.

Resolution 25.—For more stringent regulations with regard to immigration from Europe on account of the unemployment situation. Concluded in. Adopted by convention.

Austria A Bankrupt And End Is At Hand

Only a Question of Weeks, Probably Days, Before Old Nation Will Be Smashed.

Paris, Jan. 13.—The complete political collapse of Austria within a month is expected in official Austrian circles here.

"It is no longer a question of months," said Baron Elichoff, the Austrian minister to France, today. "It is only a question of weeks, perhaps days."

Although the French government has received no official confirmation of the report in a recent Berlin dispatch to the London Times that the Austrian Government had found itself "no longer in a position to continue," and that it had declared its intention to retire January 15 and place the administration of the country in the hands of the reparations commission, it was indicated at the foreign office today that no surprise would be occasioned there if it were to develop that Austria had some such move in mind.
