FREDERICTON.

Fredericton, N. B., May 19 (Special)—The local government held three sessions today, but no business of importance was transacted. Tomorrow a visit will be paid to the Normal School and in the evening the members will leave for St. John where, on Thursday, a meeting of the lunatic asylum commissioners will be held.

Captain Jayhorne, who will leave for London (Ont.) tomorrow to take up his duties, was banquetted this evening at the officers' mess. About twenty were present, and an enjoyable time was spent. Dr. George J. McNally has been appointed a coroner for York county, in succession to the late Dr. F. J. Sperry.

Private Langley, who was arrested last night by a picket from the R. C. R. I. They were both deserters. Langley put up a stout resistance. The teachers of York county will hold their institute in this city on Thursday and Friday of this week.

It has been decided to make a change in the university as regards teaching of German. Doctor Scott has been lecturing on that subject, but next term Professor Clawson will occupy the German chair.

The cleaner says A. D. Lenore, of New York, traveling auditor of the Standard Oil Company, and Major Frank, of the same company, were in Fredericton, Monday. Major Frank was quite reticent about divulging his plans, but he intimated that he would make a thorough exploration of the different oil areas of the province, spending some time in driving up and then from New Brunswick he would proceed to Nova Scotia, to look over oil areas there in the vicinity of Liverpool. He is satisfied that oil exists in New Brunswick in paying quantities, and judging from his remarks it does. The Standard Oil Company will not establish here on a large scale.

Fredericton, N. B., May 20 (Special)—A young man named Wallace Harlan, an employe of D. D. Gaudet & Son, was drowned in the river near Douglas boom at 4 o'clock this afternoon. He and another workman named Fraser Souders were in the boat which was being towed by the tug and Gibson. The tug was moving rather short and the tug in making a sudden turn toward shore caught the boat which capsized. Both men were precipitated into the water, and Harlan, being unable to swim went to the bottom before assistance could reach him. Souders managed to save himself by clinging to the boat. The tug stopped at once, it seems, and a life buoy was thrown to Harlan, but he failed to catch it.

The victim of the accident was about 19 years of age and unmarried. His father is Fred Harding, of Gibson, who was working on the boom only a few hundred yards from the scene of the accident. The body was recovered this evening in about 12 feet of water. It was viewed by Coroner Mullin, who decided that an inquest was unnecessary and was afterwards removed to deceased's late residence at Gibson.
