

## STRANGE TRANSACTIONS IN CENTRAL MATTERS YET TO BE EXPLAINED

Trace of Two Sums of \$348,000 and \$52,000  
Sought at Session Thursday.

All Susceptible of Explanation, Says Mr. Barnhill—  
Some Papers Missing, but Expected Later in the  
Enquiry—Shown that \$611,000 was Used in Some  
Way Since 1894—Manager Hunter Tells of Poor Con-  
dition of Much of Road.

The investigation into the affairs of the New Brunswick Coal & Railway Company was continued Thursday by the commissioners in the Admiralty court room. In the morning W. C. Hunter, manager of the road, said 25 miles of the track between Norton and Chipman was in bad condition and about ten miles in good shape. There were more trestles and bridges out of repair than there were in good condition. A. P. Barnhill, K. C., told of his connection with the railway and Arthur McDonald of the Bank of New Brunswick, also gave evidence.

In the afternoon the time was largely taken up in the examination of Charles A. Atkinson, who looked after the accounts for George McAvity. The absence of books resulted in the failure to trace entries for \$52,000 and \$348,000 which had been received. A number of vouchers were also declared to be missing. A. P. Barnhill, K. C., who represented Mr. McAvity, expressed the opinion that further investigation would result in a satisfactory explanation.

The method of bookkeeping was severely criticised. It was shown that the total amount received from the government and from the sale of bonds between 1894 and 1904, and the time the commissioners resigned in March, was \$611,046.50.

**A. P. Barnhill's Evidence.**  
The commission resumed its enquiry at 10.15 yesterday morning. A. P. Barnhill, K. C., was called as the first witness. He said he was one of the original incorporators of the railway. He thought it was in 1901. An organization meeting was held and he was elected a director and had also been provisional director. What are known as founders' shares were issued to the directors. He did not pay anything for shares he obtained.

There was a contract with James Barnes for the construction of the road from Minto. He could not say whether the contract was turned over to the James Barnes Construction Company. He had no knowledge of that fact.

He knew that other bonds were issued later but he did not know when. He was the company on July 16, 1903. He was quite positive that the \$450,000 in bonds were in the custody of the company.

Mr. Powell thought Mr. Barnhill was mistaken in that particular but Mr. Barnhill said he was as sure as he reasonably could be after five years.

He thought the bonds or the mortgages would show the date and other information destroyed.

In 1901 or 1902 a bond issue of \$250,000 was made but it was his impression it was a part of the \$450,000. He did not know that the government had guaranteed the bonds.

The men who were practically running the road at that time under the board of directors were the late Judge Freeman, George W. Allen and Arthur Generali Ruggles.

The loans were in amounts varying from \$5,000 up to about \$70,000 and the security in most cases was bonds of 31 or 4 per cent, guaranteed by the government.

The bank had also had a current account with the company, Mr. McDonald said, covering quite a period of time and he was required to prepare a statement showing the amounts received and paid out.

The first part of the afternoon session was taken up by Mr. Powell in reading the contract made between the late commissioners and Brown Bros. for improvements on the road.

The contract was dated Aug. 22, 1905, and amounted to \$85,000. It called for completion of the track by August 1, 1906.

It transpired that the B. C. & R. Company had failed to make any transfer to the government and the road was taken over by an order in council vested in the king subject to a first mortgage.

Commissioner Teed asked what was included in the franchise. Mr. Powell said Judge Landry said there appeared to be some question whether the government got all the franchises.

Mr. Powell replied that it appeared the coal areas were left in the hands of the skeleton company.

An interesting point was mentioned in connection with a section of the contract which stipulated that the contractors in accepting it were satisfied to assume the risk.

Mr. Barnhill, who drew up the contract, said he inserted this provision to guard against a dispute similar to that which arose in connection with the Moosey case against the city.

Before the reading of the contract, which was a very lengthy document, was completed Charles A. Atkinson, one of the witnesses, arrived and it was decided to take his evidence at once.

Mr. Atkinson was sworn and, in reply to Mr. Powell, said he was an accountant with T. McAvity & Sons. He had been in the city about ten years. He knew George McAvity, a commissioner of the road. He acted for him in the matter of drawing checks and making deposits in connection with the railway's business. He had nothing to do with grants from the government.
