## T. G. BLACKSTOCK DEAD

TORONTO LAWYER WELL KNOWN IN THE KOOTENAYS.

PROMOTED THE WAR EAGLE-CENTRE STAR FLOTATIONS.

Toronto, July 24.—T. G. Blackstock, K. C., died at his residence here today after a long illness.

Thomas Gibbs Blackstock, K.C., was the eldest son of Rev. W. S. Blackstock, D.D., Methodist minister, Toronto. He was the second member of the Toronto legal firm of Beatty, Blackstock, Fasken and Riddell, and was about 65 years of age. He married a daughter of the late George Gooderham, distiller, at Toronto, and was largely occupied in attending to his father-in-law's investments, not actively engaging in the practice of law in the courts. Those who knew Mr. Blackstock personally have always spoken of him as a kindly man, generous to a fault with his friends. He was a conservative in politics but took no active part in elections.

Mr. Blackstock visited Rossland in the summer of 1896, and becoming interested in the prospects there, he was presented for investment, went to Toronto and induced his father-in-law to go into mining, an entirely new departure for the Gooderham family. Returning to Rossland in the fall, the first property of note purchased was the Crown Point mine on the line of the Columbia and Western railway midway between Rossland and Trail. Arrangements were at once made to develop the mine on a fairly large scale, but subsequently it was abandoned for some time being, although the showing of low grade ore was probably the best ever made in the south belt. In May and June of this year the mine was reopened for a while by the Consolidated M. & S. Co., the present owners, and some 400 tons of ore were shipped to the Trail smelter and then another close down followed. In the closing days of 1896 the purchase of the War Eagle group on Red Mountain by the Gooderhams was announced, and Mr. Blackstock personally put this deal through, purchasing at the same time some of the adjoining properties and fractions. Mr. Hastings was in charge of the mine and the purchase aroused great enthusiasm in Rossland and the showing of the mine that had happened previously to attract the attention of eastern Canadians to the mineral resources of the camp. Mr. Gooderham was known all over Canada not merely as a very rich man, but as a very prudent investor, and hundreds of people followed his lead in mining, with the result, now well known, that not only were the shares of the War Eagle company rushed to a figure quite unwarranted by the situation at the mine, but many worthless properties were stocked and successfully floated in eastern Canada.

Mr. Blackstock, having unlimited money behind him and being himself carried away with the prospect of gold mining as he then understood it, planned mining on a scale previously undreamed of. After going on with the War Eagle group for a year or more, the Gooderhams purchased the Centre Star mine at a big figure and floated the new company's stock on the eastern market at a great advance. Here again Mr. Blackstock was the leading figure in the deal and in the subsequent developments. Mr. Gooderham, who had been publicly stated that the shares of both the War Eagle and Centre Star were offered at a big discount, but an eager public laughingly declared that Mr. Gooderham had a good thing and wanted it all himself, and the prices went on going up. E. B. Kirby was then engaged and placed in charge of both properties and more Gooderham money went into the Sunset mine in Rossland and subsequently into the St. Eugene mine at Moyie. Many thousands of dollars were expended by the Gooderhams, who retained control of all the properties they

purchased in B. C. and Mr. Blackstock was the one who made all the arrangements in the east and out here. At this time Mr. Blackstock paid many visits to Rossland, staying there at the hotel, and some of his quarters erected at the mines and giving his personal attention to the development of the properties and the installation of new machinery.

When came the fall in prices and in the east there arose a storm of indignation, chiefly directed against Mr. Gooderham, by people who had in many instances invested their savings in B. C. mining stocks. The last echo of that storm has hardly died away yet, and the mining industry of the Kootenays is only now recovering from the setback it then received.

Mr. Gooderham, although he retained the presidency of both the War Eagle and Centre Star mines, took no more active interest in mining matters leaving everything to Mr. Blackstock, that gentleman coming out west every few months and making the same company's meetings in Toronto. Then in quick succession came the advent of James Cronin as general manager, the retirement of E. B. Kirby, and the sale of the mine to the Consolidated company. Mr. Blackstock has been very ill for over a year, and his demise was not unexpected. He leaves a wife, just about two years ago. He leaves a wife and several children, and a brother, George Tate Blackstock, K.C., of Toronto, who is a partner in the deceased's law firm.

(Special to The Daily News) Victoria, July 28.—The Pendray inquiry terminated at noon today. Little additional evidence was taken. Higgins, being recalled, the matter of his information was gone into. To this Higgins replied that if he gave the names of his informants, he would be called. Commissioner Peters let it go at that. Higgins statements this morning were unimportant and much of the time was taken up with the question of the hearing of the government. Higgins admitted that in the light of the evidence given by Mr. Brown it was impossible for him to have been in the boat at the time of the accident, although he still regarded the deductions made from the circumstances as justified. ## A COMEDY IN COURT

Victoria, July 28.—The continued inquiry in the Pendray matter today developed, particularly in the afternoon, a comedy in the courtroom. Mrs. Anderson was on the stand and kept commissioner Peters guessing. The latter had decided in his own mind that Mrs. Anderson had gone down with a well-defined mind, and that the tender he had put in was \$2000, that she mentioned that figure at a venture, that Brown's actions confirmed her in her belief, and that she then went to her husband and communicated her discovery to him, resulting in the Logie tender of \$2100. 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## BROTHER A CAPITALIST

VANCOUVER PRISONER HELD JAPANESE GOVERNMENT BONDS

WANTS TO BECOME HIS OWN BONDSMAN FOR BAIL

Vancouver, July 27.—Desire Brothier, who is in jail awaiting trial on several charges of perjury and procuring, revealed a secret yesterday in his efforts to raise bail. He admits that he is a Pierpont Morgan on a small scale.

Until late Wednesday his bail in his own right and the bond of the Japanese government floated by the Chrysanthemum kingdom just before the war with Russia.

Late yesterday the City Trust company of Wall street, New York, which on behalf of Brothier has been in search of the highest bidder, found him and turned over to the friend of the Mikado the government bonds. But neither Brothier nor his counsel will disclose his name or the amount he gave for the securities.

The sequel soon followed. Failing to get but one surety, while Judge Henderson's order of bail calls for two, Mr. A. L. Bayley for Mr. D. G. Macdonell, who was otherwise engaged, made a request of Judge Henderson somewhat new in bail procedure. He asked that Brothier be allowed to become surety number two. But instead of giving up the usual bond, Brothier would go further. He would deposit the \$3000 in bail.

Whether this was all or part of the sum raised on the Japanese bonds was not disclosed. Brothier did not meet all the other requirements of that order of bail—himself give a bond for \$6000, and find surety number one for \$3000. The only difference was, therefore, the depositing in court of \$3000 by himself in place of getting a second surety.

"Get the consent of the attorney general, and I will consider it," was Judge Henderson's reply.

REV. STACKHOUSE COMING

Wires That He Will Be Here on Monday Next

His talk was purely an exposition of scripture and he dealt particularly with the parables of the kingdom of heaven and the Christian dispensation. He spoke also of the anti-Christ. The bible, he said, was very clear on this point. The anti-Christ would come in the guise of a man of peace and although his spirit was abroad in all sorts of heresies throughout the world he had not yet come. When he did come he would reign of peace and prosperity and his kingdom would be a material one, a commercial one.

WILL INVESTIGATE ACCIDENT Judge Morrison Appointed to Hold Inquiry re Chehalis Wreck

(Special to The Daily News) Ottawa, July 27.—Justice Morrison, local judge in admiralty, has been appointed commissioner under section 2, Shipping Casualties Act, 1903, to inquire into and report in respect to the sinking of the Chehalis by the Princess Victoria. Captain Patterson, Vancouver, and Captain Cox, Victoria, have been appointed to act as witnesses. The manager of the C. P. R. steamship lines was the first to ask an investigation.
