DEATH OF JOHN THOMSON
In the death of John Thomson,
which occurred at his home in Glen-
coe on Sunday evening, the commu-
nity loses one of its most esteemed
and valued citizens—one who had al-
ways taken a lively interest in public
affairs and was greatly esteemed by
a large circle of friends and acquaint-
ances. Mr. Thomson was one of
those pioneers to whose activities
throughout a long and useful life is
due much of the progress that is
being made in the community. In the
Methodist church, with which he had
long been connected, he had held dif-
ferent positions. He was prominent-
ly connected with the agricultural so-
ciety and other organizations, and
for many years filled the position of
chairman of the high school board
with great credit, which office he
held at the time of his death.

Mr. Thomson was in his 85th year,
and up to a few days before his pass-
ing away he retained that genial so-
cial manner for which he was always
noted. He leaves a family of two
sons and three daughters, of whom
are William G. of Moss township;
Mrs. Rose Stuart, of Glencoe, and
Miss Ophelia, at home. He is also
survived by one brother, living in
Pleinheim. Mrs. Thomson passed
away in October, 1920.

The funeral was held on Tuesday
afternoon at Oakland cemetery, ser-
vices being conducted at the home by
Rev. A. S. Whitehall, pastor of the
Methodist church, assisted by the
ministers of the Anglican and Pres-
byterian churches. There was a
large gathering of friends and ac-
