## CANADA'S TOTAL CASUALTIES

OTTAWA, May 30.—A vote of \$28,000,000 for pensions in the European war and active militia was brought up for the consideration in committee of the House to-night. Mr. Rowell stated that the total casualties up to May in the C.E.F. were 212,812, of which 63,347 were killed and died from disease, etc., and the remaining 149,465 were wounded. The item was carried on the understanding that further discussion on it would be allowed later.

DOMINION GOVERNMENT POLICY OF ENCOURAGING MUNICIPAL ERECTION ANNOUNCED

OTTAWA, May 30.—Hon. T.A. Crerar, despite rumors of retirement, is still very much in the C. inett. Most of to-day's session was devoted to the estimates of the agricultural department, and Mr. Crerar handed his estimates in person. No minister this session has had so little difficulty with his estimates. Mr. Crerar said that generally speaking, agricultural conditions were good throughout Canada. Ontario was alone backward in seeding. There was a lengthy discussion on the question of experimental farms. The only criticism was on the increase in expenditure proposed. Mr. Crerar saw this was due to the increased cost of labor and material combined with the policy of opening new farms. D.D. MacKenzie made the suggestion that small experimental farms should be established near industrial centers. F.A. Cahill, Pontiac, wanted many small demonstration farms instead of a few large experimental farms.

Mr. Crerar made an important announcement during the course of his estimates. He stated that the Government had decided on the policy of encouraging municipalities. The Dominion Government would assist the municipalities to the extent of 30 per cent. of
