"Lofty" MacMillan, provincial New Democratic Party president James Aucoin, CUPE regional director Tex Hughes, Canadian Paperwork-

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ers' Union (CPU) official Doug Homer and CLC field representative Greg Murphy.

The organizers say the local protest will be a success if all the workers who promise to participate, do so. Their aim, they said, was to create confusion and inconvience to the public the blame for which will .go back to the federal government for its wage and price controls program.

Booker said the protest would be a show of labor strength but also an indication of which unions and locals are weak. These weak unions would suffer, he said, by not participating since this would be an indication of their lack of bargaining strength.

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
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
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
