increasing our trade with your but it does give us the opportunity at any rate of realising what the position is, and them it will be for us to say whether, consistently with the interest of our own people here, we can carry out what you have suggested to us."

In response to this velcome overture, I have pleasure in giving you a brief statement of our position.

Canada has been the pioneer in the motora development

of preferential trade within the British Empire. She gave the
first preference to British goods in 1897-8, and took the initiative
in requested the abrogation of treaties which stood in the way of
Emperial preference. This policy she has steedfastly mintained.
The Canadian preference now covers, in varying degrees, practically
the whole range of competitive British emports to the Dominion.

During the last session of Parliament, a ten per cent. discount on
existing duties, constituting a further increase in the prevailing
preference, was provided in the case of British goods imported
through a Canadian port. Canada has given preference in her own
interest as well as what she conceived to be the interest of the rest
of the Empire. It has never hitherto, in the case of the United
Kingdom, been made combitional on the grant of an equal preference
in return. We have at all times recognised the importance of
