PRODUCTION

During the quarter 88 aeroplanes were produced against a schedule of 90. This compares with production in the preceding quarter of 76 aircraft. It should also be recorded that in the four months December -March, during which the plant was scheduled to produce 30 aircraft per month (peak production), 112 aircraft were produced against a schedule of 120. Of the deficiency six occurred in December.
