# FOR RYLLAWS

Important Conferences Held, But Results a Secret.

sian Press Savagely Attacks the Bureaucroy—The Japanese Lose is Three Torpedo Boats, Three Officers and 200 Men—Admiral Rojectversky, a Priconce in Their Hands, Has Practured Skull but May Recover.

Fractured Skull but May Renover.
Lendon, June 1.—Little hope for the Russians can be found in the last despatches regarding the naval battle off feu Island: Only four of the vessels of Rojestvensky's fleet are known to have reached Viadivestock, the cruiser Almaz and the torpado boat dastroyer Grozni, Brava and Torosiahty.

The full street of the Russian casualties in men and officers drowned wounded or captured is not yet known. The Japaness losses, as reported from Tokio, are only three torpedo boats sunk, three officers killed and about 500 men killed or disabled. Not one of the big fighting ships of the Japanese navy was lost. It is now definitely known that Vice Admiral Rojestvensky is captured. He is seriously wounded, but, it is stated from Tokio, will recover. Admiral Pogo has of Japan.
