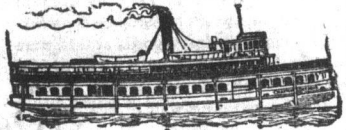

CHATHAM TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

The regular monthly meeting of the township of Chatham council was held at the Township hall on Monday, the sixth day of April, 1903, pursuant to adjournment. The members were all present and the minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted.

John Soutor and other ratepayers were present and presented a petition requesting that a new school section be formed, out of portions of sections 9, 13 and 14 in the township of Chatham, the petition was received and read, but no action taken.

A letter was read from James Travis, requesting to have his statute labor commuted and that he be allowed to perform the same on the south side of the 12 and 13 concessions road, just west of the Prince Albert side road.

Mr. Robert Burns was present and submitted a report stating that the Glasgow drain is in a good condition and that his time spent as commissioner was six days—Report adopted. The boards of trustees of school sections numbered six and eight were present pursuant to notice that the council intends to pass a by-law changing the boundaries of said sections.

A notice that the Irving drain is very much in need of repair was read of lot 3, con. 11.

A letter was read from the Hamilton Bridge Co., offering to erect a steel swing bridge with wooden floor Tupperville for the sum of \$9,125 and from Rowen and Elliott, general contractors, St. Catharines, Ont., offering to construct the substructure for said proposed bridge according to the plans and specifications of Engineer W. G. McGeorge for the sum of \$1,000.

Moved by Mr. Templeton and Mr. Tompkins that the statute labor of James Travis be commuted for a period of three years on condition that he complete a portion of the road ditch on the south side of the 13th concession road as agreed on, to the satisfaction of the commissioner of the council having charge of the fourth division, said commissioner to report when work is finished.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Thompson and Mr. George that the by-law detaching the 3 1/2 of lots 13 and 14, concession from school section No. 8 and adding the same to section 6, all in the township of Chatham be finally passed.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Abraham and Mr. Templeton, that as complaint has been made by Mr. John McDonald that the Irving drain is out of repair, that the clerk notify A. McDonald, C.E., that he (Mr. McDonald) is hereby appointed and instructed to make an examination and survey of the said Irving drain and report on its repair and improvement.

Moved by Mr. George and Templeton, that the tender of the Hamilton Bridge Co. for the steel structure for Tupperville bridge be accepted and that steel floor strings be substituted in place of the wooden ones mentioned in said tender also that the tender of Rowen and Elliott, St. Catharines, Ont., be accepted for the substructure for the proposed bridge and that the reeve and Councilors Abraham and Tompkins be hereby appointed and empowered as a committee to do all things necessary for letting, closing and executing the contract with the said companies for the said work.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Abraham and Mr. Templeton that as application has been made by Mr. Courter and others to have some trees trimmed and some cut down and removed on Taylor avenue and also by Edgar French to have some trees cut along the fifth concession, that the consent of this council is hereby given for the same and that the commissioner of the first division is empowered to have said work done.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. George and Mr. Tompkins that the time for the tax collectors to return their collection rolls to the treasurer be extended to the 15th of May, 1903.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. George and Mr. Templeton that the account of J. R. Gutteridge for disinfecting the house of Mr. Barr, infected with smallpox and the account of Dr. Charteris, medical health officer, in connection with the same matter be referred to Councilor Tompkins to investigate and with power to settle.—Carried.

The following accounts were ordered paid: Alex. Williston, commissioner Skinner drainage works, \$62; Frank Davis, two-thirds value two sheep, \$8; B. Holmes, inspecting sheep killed by dogs, \$1.50; Warren Myers, repairing fence, \$1; Josephus Miller, keeping Mrs. Taylor, one month, \$4; A. McDonald, C.E., inspecting drains and lands, and witness fees re Hoyle's law suit, \$18.50; Wallaceburg Herald, printing audit report, \$51.40; John Johnston, two-thirds value sheep killed, \$10.66; J. W. Brown, part salary as collector, \$100; Thomas Bessette, repairing ferry, \$1.50; John Wilcox, running ferry, \$27; Robt. Burns, six days commissioner Glasgow drain, \$12.

Meeting adjourned. Clerk.

AMONG DEAD MEN'S BONES.

Gruesome Work on Wreck of the Algoma.

Duluth, Minn., May 12.—The steamer J. C. Suit, which has been chartered for the season to be used in stripping some of the old wrecks on Lake Superior, has just returned from the wreck of the Canadian passenger steamer Algoma, which was lost nineteen years ago, with fifty-two lives. What is left of the steamer is on the south coast of Isle Royale. The wreckers worked among the bones of the dead when taking up the 150 tons of iron which formed part of the ship's cargo. The Suit will at once return to the wreck and remove the bar iron in the hold of the lost ship.

FARMER DELEGATES.

The Canadians Who Are Doing Work for the Dominion in England.

A London correspondent, writing from the Metropolis on the 3rd March, says: We have fifty five Canadians more this week in England than we had last week. All the farmer delegates from Manitoba and the Northwest have arrived, and have distributed themselves throughout the length and breadth of the land to talk and perhaps sing the praises of the great Dominion of Canada. There is very little doubt but that their work of the next few weeks will result in great good for Canada, and even now the announcement in the newspapers that these delegates have arrived has aroused keen interest to hear what they have to say about Canada and the chances there are there to get to the top of the tree.

The farmer delegates have been distributed as follows:—London, including south and west of England, 18; Birmingham district, 11; Liverpool district, 10; Glasgow district, 5; Cardiff (for Wales), 4; Belfast, Ireland, 2.

Cost of an Acre of Wheat.

While on the subject of emigration the following perhaps may be of interest to many wheat raisers in Canada, as it shows the cost of producing an acre of wheat in this country. The cost is as follows:—Twelve carts of manure at 50 per cart, \$23; ploughing, 10s; rolling, 1s; harrowing twice, 2s; seed, 7s 6d; drilling, 2s; harrowing, 1s; striking up, 1s; water harrowing, 1s; harrowing in spring, 1s; rolling, 1s; hoeing over, 2s 6d; harvesting, 15s; thrashing, 2s; threshing, 7s; carting out, 5s; rent, 12s; taxes, 2s 6d. Total expenses, £6 13s 6d.
