SELBY P. WOOD SALLS HOME.

After making a brief visit to the United States, accompanied by his wife and two children, Selby P. Wood, managing director of the Australian Provincial Assurance Association, sailed for his home at Sydney, N. S. W., last week. Wood visited this country for the purpose of looking over the field, with a view to entering his company in one or more States and also in Canada. He found, however, that the legal restrictions were so many and varied that it would not be worth while to enter the Australian Provincial, as a number of years would elapse before the business could be placed on a paying basis. The association is now in its seventh year of existence and is doing remarkably well in Australia and New Zealand. Mr. Wood may possibly plant the association in Great Britain before long, but the United States and Canada are now out of the reck-

oning, as far as he is concerned.—The Spectator, New York.
