Market Review and Forecast

TORONTO, Monday, June 18.—Weather conditions have been favorable to crop growth and crop reports are more satisfactory than earlier in the season. The food situation, however, still gives cause for uneasiness. The crops of the southern hemisphere have now been harvested and they are not more than one-half of normal. In the United States the Government states this year's wheat crop at 656,000,000 bushels, or only 16,000,000 bushels larger than the harvest of 1916, and 115,000,000 bushels less than the average yield for the five years, 1911-15, inclusive. Grain markets have been quiet this past week with slight advances in wheat. Mill feeds tend to ease up, hay has declined, the pig market has dropped considerably and live stock, too, is selling at lower levels. There is little change in the dairy produce market.

Early in the week a decrease in the visible supplies sent west up. The unusually good growing weather of the last few days, however, has caused another recession, but prices are still in advance of last week. No. 1 northern is quoted at \$2.75; Ontario wheat, No. 2 winter, \$2.61 to \$2.58. According to freights outside; No. 3 winter, \$2.58 to \$2.53.

Cattle and Hogs.
The week has been quiet. There has been more export demand for cubs and a firmer market. Other grades are quoted nominally only. Quotations follow: Cows, No. 2, 71¢; cubs, \$1.15 to \$1.20. Montreal quotations: Oaxa, C. W. No. 2, 80¢ to 81¢; No. 3, 78½¢ to 79½¢; No. 1 feed, 73½¢ to 74½¢; corn, \$1.75 to \$1.80; barley, feed, \$1.20 to \$1.22.

Mill Feeds.
Pastures are now good; there is no stock left in the stables and consequently there is a surplus of mill feeds on hand. Prices may be expected to sag from now on. Toronto quotations bran in car lots at \$21, shorts at \$21, middlings, \$43; good feed flour, per bag, \$2.80 to \$2.85. Montreal quotations: No. 34; shorts, \$40; middlings, \$42 to \$44; moulie, \$46 to \$51.

Hay and Straw.
The marked improvement in crop prospects in the last few days has had a corresponding effect in the market for old hay. Extra No. 2 hay is now quoted on track, Toronto, at \$12 to \$13.50, mixed, \$9 to \$11.50, and straw, \$5. Montreal quotes hay, \$13 to \$14.

Potatoes and Beans.
New potatoes are quoted on this mar-

ket at \$13 per bushel for No. 1 and \$12 for No. 2. Western potatoes are a bare. At Montreal supplies are very short, Delawares being quoted at \$4.10 and Green Mountains at \$3.75. Beans—Japanese hand-picked, \$7.50 to \$8.50; Canada hand-picked, bushel, \$9.50; prime, \$8.75.

Hides and Wool.
Country market—sheep hides, flat, cured, 20¢ to 21¢; deacons or bob calf at \$1.75 to \$2.50 each; horsehide, country in-kill-off, No. 1, 45 to 57; No. 2, 45 to 54; No. 1 sheepskins, \$2 to \$2.50. Horsehair, farmers' stock, 37¢. Wool—Unwashed fleece wool as to quality, fine, 52¢; coarse, 42¢. Washed wool, fine, 68¢; coarse, 52¢.

Eggs and Poultry.
The bottom seems to have fallen out of the egg market. Prices in United States have slumped and with the British market at 40¢ a dozen, dealers claim that they will have to buy eggs in Canada at 28¢, and shipping expenses seem to be 12 cents. Prices at country points are now down to 30¢ and the f.o.b. quotation is 31¢ to 32¢. Montreal quotes to the trade, 40¢ on selected stock; No. 1, 37¢; No. 2, 34¢ to 35¢.

Dairy Produce.
Weakness developed in the butter market early in the week and reductions of one-half cent to three-quarter cents were noted. Toward the end of the week the Montreal market firmed, but here prices seem to have taken a permanent drop. There is considerable buying for export
