We hardly know whether to be glad that what we love is coming to receive even a little apprecia-tion from outsiders, or to be vexed be cause the !addists are so thoughtless and superficial as not to dig for a foundation to their little devout (?) practises. However, we can afford to be kind and charitable to them. These half attempts at understanding this love and they may be productive of good though we must confess an unsenti mental, serious person, who will confron the problems of faith and wrestle with them, is more promising for conversion than fickle butterflies who only rejoice in the sunshine and cluster about the fragrant flowers of Catholic devotion. -Paulist Calendar.
