Paris, July 28 .- A committee of the Crusade of the Women of France including Mesdames Alphonse Daudet, Emil Sol, Augagneur, Poincare, Vi-viani and Derouled, the Duchess of Rohan and the Countess of Greenfulhe, passed a resolution yesterday condemning the sale of alcoholic beverages in the shops of confection. ers, tobacconists and coal merchants, and demanding that the sale of spirits be prohibited in communities where munitions of war are manufactured. The prefect of police, charged with the enforcement of the anti-alcoholic order issued by General Gallieni, military governor of Paris, on request of the liquor dealers association, has defined the alcoholic beverages con-templated in the order to exclude beers and non-aromatized natural wines under sixteen degrees of alco-
