The company has two large buildings situated on St. George street south of the G. T. R. tracks. One of the buildings is 160 feet by 50 feet and the other 180 feet by 50 feet in dimensions. Both departments are very bright and fitted with up-todate mechinery and fixtures. The shops are heated by the exhaust steam from the boilers throughout and the electric light plant is their own, with a capacity of 170 lights. The works is well situated, being right alongside the Grand Trunk Railway with a siding running in between the two buildings, making shipping faculties convenient.

The firm is employing the year round from forty to forty-five employees, and at present are employ-ing 43, with good salaries. Only two apprentices are working, and these
