A SATISFACTORY TEST.

At eleven o'clock last night seven bricks composed of the cement which is to be used in the concrete foundation for the King street pavement were tested by the city engineer, Mr. Dale, of the Thorold cement works, and Mr. Stockton, the overseer. These bricks had been made by Mr. Dale at eleven o'clock Thursday night and had been allowed to stand for the regulation 1 hour in the water and 23 hours in the air. The average resisting power to the square inch of the seven bricks was shown to be 1085 pounds. This would have been higher had not one brick been kept out of the water altogether, being placed in the air as soon as made. This brick tested at 99 pounds and so pulled down the average. As it would be impossible to put a pressure of 108 pounds upon one square inch of the concrete under any ordinary conditions, the test was considered to be more than satisfactory. The specifications call for a test of 700 pounds.
