

Catholic Peers Desired Withdrawal of Statement Concerning Security

London, Ont., August 5 .- There is ia ion was challenged at the third reading of the King's declaraiont bill this evening in the House of Lords, it is generally believed that no further attempt will be made to pass it either this session or the next. Lord Salisbury, the Premier, referring to the statement of Catholic Peers, said the government now realized that the Catholics did not wish the offensive words of the original declaration to he withdrawn unless the government at the same time withdrew the declaration regarding the security of the Protestant succession. The government never had the slightest intention of withdrawing that. The Catholics regretted that they must be prepared to see the declaration stands in its pre-

TRADES UNIONS.

The House of Lords to-day rendered an important judgment affecting trades unions. The case was brought up on appeal from the judgment of the Irish courts, awarding a wholesale butcher damages against the Butchers' Assistants' Association, which brought pressure to bear on retailers to boycott the plaintiff until he dismissed a certain non-union employe, threatening otherwise to call out the union employes of the firms concerned, and finally it induced the non-unionist to leave the plaintiff. The Lords dismissed the appeal, on the ground that the acts of wrongful and malicious conspiracy were not undertaken to advance the intercests of the workmen themselves, but sole ly to imjure the plaintiff.

SHOT HER SISTER.

York, Pa., Aug. 5. — Mrs. Sarah Knaub, of this city, aged about 18 years, was shot and killed by her sister, Mrs Heary Reilly, at Pleasure-ville, a suburb of York, early yester-day morning. Mrs. Knaub, who was visiting her sister, was aroused by chicken thieves. She awoke her sis-ter, and the two discovered two men prowling about the premises. Mrs. Knaub pointed out the thieves to Mrs. Reilly, and Mrs. Reilly fired. The shot took effect in Mrs. Knaub's back. Mrs. Knaub did not know she was shot, and for a period of ten minutes kept a lookout for the thieves. She was then seen to fall over and died in ten minutes. Her death was ater's investigation, which showed that death was the result of a pistol shot wound inflicted accidentally.

Leaving Examinations.

Splendid Showing by Kent's Represen atives—Other Results to Follow in ten Days.

The seport of the Board of Examiners for the Part 1 Junior Leaving, or Public School Leaving examination is given below. The results of the examinations at all the examination centres in any county will be found under that county. The figure 5 indicates that the candidate has passed in the five subjects of the examination; the figure 3 indicates that the candidates, who are exempted from the composition, and geography, have passed in the remaining three subjects of the examination. The certificates of successful candidates will be forwarded within three weeks to the High School Principals, and, in the case of centres other thian High Schools, to the Public School Inspectors concerned. Under no conditions will candidates obtain certificates or concerned at the Education Decopies of marks at the Education De-partment. In order to avoid unnecessary trouble and expense, unsuccessful candidaces are recommended to obtain the advice of the Principal, after receiving their marks, before making an appeal.
