

Two Classes of Militia.

The existing defensive forces of Canada consist of two classes of militia, enlisted voluntarily. These are divided into two categories—the first consisting of what is termed the permanent force, and the second of the active militia. The first-mentioned is a small body of all arms, who are, to all intents and purposes, regular troops. They are permanently under arms, live in barracks, when not engaged in field training, and have the benefit of a liberal pension scheme for all ranks. They include two regiments of mounted troops, two batteries of horse artillery, a regiment composed of ten companies of infantry, an engineer corpe, an army service corps, and an ordnance store corps. In addition, there are the Northwest Mounted Police, a body of men resembling the Cape Mounted Riftes in South Africa, and, although employed entirely on police duty in the Northwest, are really soldiers of the most efficient type.

Total Membership.

The total membership of the civilian rifle associations, according to the latest available returns, is 20,498. Both the military and civilian rifle chibs are affiliated to the Canadian Rifle League, and by a militia order of June, 1903, are placed under the supervision of the Militia Department at Ottawa. Four rifle meetings are held annually by the league, under King's Prize conditions, at which valuable prizes are offered for competition. In addition, certificates, signed by the Minister for Militia and Defence and the Chief of the General Staff, are issued to marksmen who "I understand you refused to accept a gift from my daughter, Sam?"

The training of the Canadian militia does not compare favorably with that of our own volunteers. For what are termed rural corps—that is, battalions raised in the country districts—the only drills are those performed during the annual 12 days in camp. Neither officers nor men do any military work during the rest of the year, save a few ceremonial movements practiced just before the annual inspection. The city corps do not go to camp at all, owing to the exigencies of employment in Canada. They have drill sheds in the various towns, where drills are done on certain evenings during the year. It will be seen, therefore, that the opportunities for learning their work are less than are afforded to our own volunteers. No doubt a volunteer is nominally efficient who does fifteen evening drills and his class firing in musketery, but that type of citizen soldier is not generally much admired, and his services are dispensed with as speedily as possible.


The housewife will at once low chest on wheels which may be rolled under the bed or moved about from room to room at will. Such a chest comes both in bamboo or cedar and is suitable in the summer cottage as well as in the town house or apartment, where every inch of space counts. On a heavy ce-dar chest particularly these funny lit-tle wheels are most convenient. Such a chest is somewhat deeper and con-siderably longer than the ordinary bu-reau drawer, and the convenience of its size and shape is obvious.

We are all familiar with the pretty

bamboo chests which are decorative as well as useful and make very nice window seats piled up with cushions. Where there is a bay window a seat can be built around it for very little expense and may have lids, so that it also serves as a chest, or have shelves beneath, hidden by denim or silk cush-lens to match the draperies.

Rich Shades For Winter.

"Blue will be high in favor this fall and winter," says the Woman's Home Companion, "and that certainly is good news, because blue is pretty apt to be becoming to pretty nearly everybody. Navy and real blue are both looked upon as fashion leaders. Copenhagen blue and nattier blue, or old blue, are both high style shades.

"Many brown shades will also be used—russet, havana and the leather shades. Browns showing a coppery tinge will be modish as well as deep mahogany tones. In greens we have the preference given to forest green, which is a beautiful rich leaf tint, not so yellow as olive, and is much more becoming. It will be much seen in the plain fabrics.

"The bronze greens will also be worn. A beautiful deep American Beauty rose shade will be stamped the mode, and many bordeaux reds will be favored. Two grays will be especially fashionable—the gray we see in silver and the darker mouse shade. The tendency, however, is toward dark shades. Fabrics show indeterminate effects and beautiful minglings of soft, dull colors. Black will make itself conspicuous in both the new fabrivs and the new trimmings."

ARBITRATION OBLIGATORY.

Hague Conference Favors Important Principle—Good Results Obtained. Principle—Good Results Obtained.
The Hagne, Oct. 12.—The following is the text of the declaration drafted by Count Tornelli; Italy, in accord with the leading delegation to the Peace Conference:
The conference unanimously favors:
"I. The principle of obligatory arbitration."

"2. That certain differences, especially those regarding the interpretation and application of conventional clauses are susceptible to being submitted to obligatory arbitration with

clauses are susceptible to being submitted to obligatory arbitration without restriction.

"The conference unanimously preclaims that while a convention on
the subject was not concluded, the
differences of opinion had more of a
judicial character, as all the states
of the world, in working together for
four months, not only learned to
know each better by getting closer
together, but developed during this
long collaboration high ideals for
the common welfare."

After a long dehate the arbitration
committee adopted Count Tornelli's
declaration, which was accepted by
all the delegations except those of
the United States, Japan, Hayti and
Turkey, which abstained from voting.
Joseph H. Choate, United States,
was much applauded during his
aspeech, explaining the abstention of
the American delegation.
