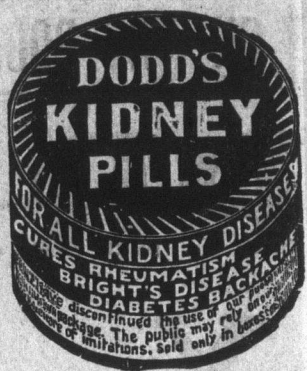

#### TROLLEY CAR COLLISION.

**Motorman Receives Fatal Injuries in Street Car Collision.**  
Washington, July 4.—A dozen persons were seriously injured and as many more slightly hurt in a collision yesterday between a Washington-bound trolley car and two cars loaded with steel rails were pushed out without waiting for the Washington trolley to pass. The rails on the forward car extended several feet beyond the truck, and when the crash came they ripped into the passenger car, almost completely telescoping it. One rail passed entirely through the abdomen of Motorman William Mock, who died later in the day, and one passenger had both legs severed.

#### SENDING CHINESE HOME.

**Work of Repatriation Has Begun in South Africa.**  
Durban, Africa, July 4.—One thousand nine hundred and forty-eight repatriated Chinese laborers sailed from here Tuesday for home. Measures were adopted last month for the abolition of Asiatic immigration to Natal by Dec. 31, 1908, and providing at the same time for the repatriation of the Chinese coolies now in the colony at the termination of their contracts.

#### OLD VIOLINS.

**Reasons Why Ancient Fiddles Are Better Than New.**  
Fabulous prices are sometimes paid for old violins, and many an enthusiastic musician would part with his last dollar to possess one of the masterpieces of Stradivarius or Guarneri, or another of the famous makers of a century or two ago.

The questioned superiority of these old and often battered instruments has been variously ascribed to the peculiar quality of the varnish used in their construction, to the elasticity of the wood employed and to the ripening and improving effects of age and long use.

Of late years, however, much credence has been given the suggestion of an eminent authority that the reason is due to a peculiar warping of the wood to a higher arch, a buckling caused by the position of the "f" holes and sound post.

It might at first thought be supposed that the same effect could be produced by giving an equal arching to a new instrument, but the effect, if attained, is not permanent, because with age the arching increases until too great a degree of rigidity is the result.

"Plugging" a Hotel Guest.  
The hotel detective stepped out of the elevator and walked over to the counter.

"Plugged him? Who? What for? Where did you hit him?" quickly asked a friend who was standing by.

## CANADIAN IS CHAMPION

**Tommy Burns Wins Out In Two Minutes And Eight Seconds**

**Squires Goes Down And Out With One Stiff Punch**

San Francisco, July 4.—Bill Squires, the much-heralded champion pugilist of Australia, succumbed to the blow of a Canadian first at Colma to-day after he had been in the ring two minutes. The men who witnessed the brief meeting between the two fighters were charitable enough to call him a "dub." They designated him as a "false altham" who should have been pitted against a fourth-rate fighter rather than any pugilist with the slightest possession of ring skill.

To say that the 6,000 persons who journeyed out to Colma to witness the fight were disappointed would be phrasing it mildly. Indeed, it was a hot day and the journey to Colma was disagreeable. Hundreds of persons came from other states to see the leading fighter of the Antipodes battle with the light-weight champion of America and anticipation was keyed up to the highest point. From the standpoint of the average spectator the outcome would have been amusing if less effort had been required to reach the arena.

#### ENDED WHEN STARTED.

The fight was as good as ended the moment the gong sounded for the men to advance to the centre of the ring. That the defensive skill of the Australian was exceedingly poor was speedily attested, for in the ten seconds he was prone on the mat. A well directed right by Burns struck him flush on the jaw. It did not have force enough behind it to give Squires his quietus, and after taking a count of four he rose again and again the champion of Australia was on the canvas, with Jeffries standing over him slowly calling off the seconds.

#### SQUIRES WAS GAME.

But Squires evidently had some staying powers in the face of punishment, for he rose weakly and slowly while Jeffries held Burns back until his adversary was in a position to defend himself. Squires had little defence left. The terrific rights to the jaw had accomplished the result and the man was barely in position again when the Canadian resumed his tiling aggressive campaign. Burns landed where he pleased and in a few seconds the rain of blows caused the Australian to drop his arms helplessly.

Then came the finish. Burns deliberately hit his mark and with all his power sent his right to the point of the jaw. It landed a user less than a Jiffy to go through the formality of counting the man out. There was not a spectator in the arena who did not realize that the fight was over and a rush was made for the ring to congratulate the victor.

#### 2 MINUTES 8 SECONDS.

The fight lasted exactly two minutes and eight seconds, and it proved nothing more than that Squires was an overrated man. Burns demonstrated his immense superiority over the Australian, who did not have an opportunity to show what he is actually entitled to the high pugilistic title that has been bestowed upon him or not.

#### SON DYING, MOTHER GONE.

**Charles Lancaster's Pathetic Search For His Missing Wife.**  
Detroit, Mich., July 4.—While his four-year-old son lies dying on a farm near Woodstock, Ont., as a result of being kicked by a horse, Charles Lancaster is vainly searching Detroit for his wife, who left him last week. The couple had a disagreement, and Mrs. Lancaster left her husband to go to London, Ont. Lancaster placed his little son with friends on the farm. Tuesday the little fellow was playing about the stables, and was kicked by a vicious horse, and is thought to be dying. The distraught father thought of his wife in his new trouble and wired to London to reach her. Word came back that she had returned to Detroit, and yesterday he appealed to the police to aid him in his search.

#### COULDN'T DELIVER THE GOODS.

**And Fake Advertiser Had to Give Back Money He Got.**  
St. Thomas, Ont., July 4.—Norman Lindop of this city answered an advertisement for a Buffalo firm, offering for sale ready-made cottages. Lindop sent \$275, but repeated queries brought no answer.

He went to Buffalo, enlisted legal aid, and went to the address, but the proprietor could not produce the cottages and was forced to disgorge the \$275.

Three stenographers were at work in the office and stacks of mail were in evidence. The business is well advertised in Canadian papers.
