### AN ERRING SCRIBE.

At last night's meeting of the Public School Board, it was found necessary to hand out a stiff reprimand to a local newspaper correspondent for sending incorrect and damaging reports to the London Free Press, relative to the business conducted by the Board. It is hard to imagine a man who will deliberately write groundless and slanderous articles about the people of his own city, and send them to outside papers, just because it nets him a little money. Chatham, above all places, should be free from such men. Every person in Chatham should be a booster.

Some philosopher has said to beware of the fury of a patient man. This is well applied in the case in hand, for it is not the first time that erroneous reports have been sent to this paper. Repeated warnings have been given this same correspondent, and the School Board is one of the bodies of men who are losing all patience with his uncalculated actions.

Evil reports of wrong doing have never yet built up a city, and it is time that these particular ones were put a stop to. If the correspondent wishes to enter into a campaign of criticism and wholesale knocking, he should at least have some foundation for the stuff he writes, and offers for sale to outside papers.

### NO HELP NEEDED.

Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman's anxiety to settle the "questions" alleged to be outstanding between Canada and the United States is not shared by the people of the Dominion; whatever the attitude of the Ottawa Government on the subject may be, said the Mail and Empire, in a sensibly written editorial on this topic recently. With reference to one "question"—that of trade, we certainly have no desire for a bargain. The United States has consistently rejected all reasonable suggestions looking to better relations, and now the National Policy of Canada has made us independent of our neighbors. The only reform of a commercial character that is needed by Canada, in so far as the United States is concerned, is a lift in our tariff under which the huge importations of manufactured products from the other side will be cut down.

There can be no discussion, continues the Mail, of the question of reciprocity with tariffs in their present condition. The United States tariff is determined against us. Our tariff under the Fielding amendments is ridiculously favorable to a country that declines to buy from Canada. We cannot prudently enter upon negotiations with the tariffs in this lop-sided condition, because, bargaining with the present state of affairs as the basis, we are bound to get the worst of it. The next issue that is said to be ripe for settlement is the North Atlantic fishery question. But we do not believe that this is a "question" calling for attention, at all events, on the part of Canada. The present treaty—that of 1818—governs the fisheries. Under it we have our rights within the three-mile limit, and the fishermen of the United States are required to restrict themselves to their own waters or to non-territorial waters. There is no need for a change here. Canada is satisfied. If the Americans have any offer to make, let them make it. But no proposition ought to come from the Dominion. We consented, in the Chamberlain-Tupper Treaty of 1888, to make regulations and to participate in surveys which would have the effect of reducing the friction that is sometimes created by the enforcement of the Treaty of 1818. But, after signing the convention, our neighbors withdrew from it, and, in view of that fact, we ought not to be in a hurry to negotiate again. The seal "question" is not a question with regard to which any change in the arrangement is required by us. The Paris award gives the United States the seal islands and a good share of the sea around them, as an exclusive possession. It also limits the area within which the

Canadian sealer can operate in the open ocean, and fixes a close season. The United States has the best end of this bargain, and there is no reason why the matter should be considered, except in the interests of Canada, and the Dominion is not calling for any change.

Sir Henry is laboring under a delusion if he thinks there are outstanding Canadian "questions" demanding solution by his Government. There are no such issues, and, so far as can be gathered, the subjects that are open to international discussion are very few and small. Equally in error are the English journals which come so gallantly to our aid in this matter. We are assured by some of these papers that the present Imperial Government will allow Canada to be represented should negotiations be opened, and that, as a result, we shall have, for the first time, a voice in the settlement of our own affairs. It seems to be forgotten that we acquired the right to negotiate through our own representatives as far back as 1817, when the Washington Treaty was agreed to, and that no treaty binds us unless our Parliament gives it the stamp of approval.

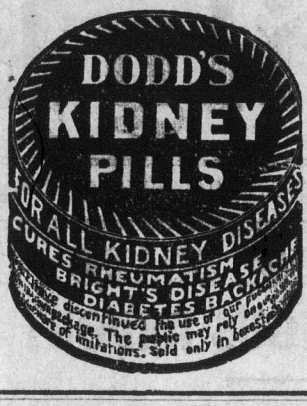

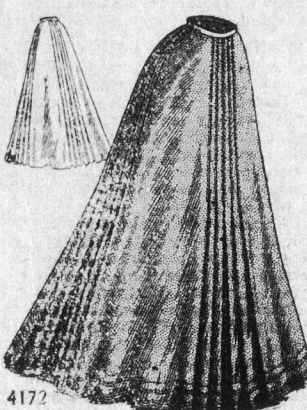

### WHAT IS WORN.

Hatpins Match the Hair Combs—New Ideas in Stocks—Artistic Bangles.

A new idea in regard to hatpins is to have them match the combs worn in the hair. These are of polished tortoise shell or amber, or, at any rate, of much lighter color than has been worn for some time. A pear shaped hatpin of amber with amber combs produces a very pretty effect, whether the hair is dark or light.

A smart stock has a long slot button-hole horizontally across the lower edge in front. Through this is drawn a short strip with kite shaped ends, practically forming the "tabs" which are sewn on most stocks. The advantage is that it can be slipped either one way or the other and knotted or pinned down as one likes in front.

Collars with rounded corners embroidered in dots and figures all over the collar are very new. The long four-in-hands worn with them are in strong Scotch plaids or small black

and white checks or in black. Many of these are narrow, though the newest are about two inches wide.

Blue and violet linen turn back collars and cuffs simply stitched are to be worn with linen suits.

The latest variation of the sun plaid skirt is very pretty and graceful. It is circular in shape and falls in ample folds and fullness from a plain yoke.

The embroidered linen hat, with a bow of ribbon for its only trimming, is used with the linen jacket for street wear, but with more elaborate gowns of muslin or organdie a hat of sheer material in shadow work with flowers and ribbons should be donned.

Since the coming of the short sleeves and the return of the bracelet the neck chain and the chataigne bag have taken a back seat. My lady now spends her money and her time looking for artistic bangle bracelets.

The frock in the cut is of white foulard with pin dots of black. The skirt is cut in two pieces, each ruffle trimmed with a bowknot design effected with German val lace insertion. 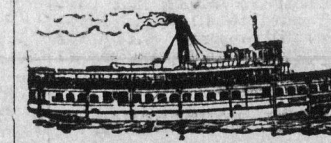
