Mutual Company Not Founded to Make Money For Policyholders But a Great Philanthropic Enterprise.

New York, N.Y., Oct. 11.—The sessions of the insurance investigating committee were terminated for the week at the adjournment yesterday, because of the death of S. Fred Nixon, speaker of the Assembly, at his home in Westfield, just about the time the committee was adjourning for the day. Sir Richard John Leng, member of the British Parliament was a guest of the insurance investigation committee at its sessions vertering. sessions yesterday.

The first witness was Robert Oliphant, chairman of the expenditure committee of the Mutual Life Insurance Company. From him it was expected to learn what became of \$75,000 charges to learn was expected.

pected to learn what became of \$75.000 charged to legal expenses. The Mutual Life maintains a confidential fund for legal expenses. He had heard contributions were made to campaign committees, and supposed they came out of this confidential fund.

Vice-President Robert A. Grannis was called. He knew of the contributions to the fund, but not the amounts. Contributions were made to state campaign funds. Mr. Grannis said he had instructed Mr. Thummel from time to instructed Mr. Thummel from time to time relative to attention to legisla-tion in various states, but he could not recall the particulars.

Gillette Justifies.

Walter R. Gillette, vice-president of the Mutual Life, testified that the company contributed \$40,000 to the Republican National Committee's campaign fund in 1904, \$35,000 in 1900 and \$15,000 in 1896. He justified the contributions

He said he had made the contract with the firm of H. C. Raymond and Company, agents, of his own volition and no one was responsible for this contract prior to 1903 but the witness and the president. He did not know anyone who could tell what legal matters required payment of \$100,000 in

one year to the general solicitor.
