Los Angeles Times: Under a poll of some 1,500 manufacturers, bankers and educators, taken by an eastern trade journal, prohibition was given almost overwhelming endorsement. It was found that more than 85 per cent of those interrogated were in favor of absolute prohibition and not more than 7 per cent favored the general admission of beer and wines. No questions were asked as to what private stocks those interviewed were carrying, but there was a reasonably unanimous opinion that prohibition was good for the other fellow, at any rate.
