A FURTHER RETIREMENT.

Last night's dispatches received
by The Herald tell of German Land-
wehr troops being engaged in a
fierce fighting along the
Dutch-Belgian border, the enemy
evidently contemplating a retreat
to that depth in a desperate
effort to prevent the Allied advance
from entering upon German soil.
Yesterday's dispatches continue of
a most encouraging nature and at
almost every point of the extended
battleline the Germans are suffering
defeat.With the exception of the sector
towards Cambrai where they have
smashed the Quentz switch and in
the Concor forest southwest of Leam,
the Allies have not yet arrived at
the Hindenburg Line. East of Be-
saune and Peronne they have re-
ached points within six to twelve miles
of the line. South of St. Quentin
they are within three miles of it at
Reargier, between the Oise and the
Aisne they are almost on it for a
considerable part, and beyond it
near the St. Gobain forest, west of
Leam.Where the front turns eastward
beyond Soissons, the Allies have oc-
cupied the positions north of the
Aisne taken by them after the first
battle of the Marne. Farther east
the Americans are on the south of
the Aisne but advancing towards the
river. The Germans along the
Aisne are still seven miles from the
Chemin des Dames from which they
expelled the French last May, and
nine miles from the Ailette, fromwhich their Aisne offensive was
launched. Undoubtedly they will
retreat to the Chemin des Dames,
but whether they will be able to
stay there will depend upon the ex-
tent to which General Mangin's ar-
my north of Soissons has outflank-
ed this plateau.Thus, with the exception of the
two important flank positions, the
enemy has been able to keep his
front intact going around without
fighting at some places and offering
a stiff rearward resistance at others
where he has to fight hard to
get his guns away, or where he
thinks he can exact a heavy price
from his pursuers. But he has had
to pay dearly himself in smashing
his way north of Soissons
where, in order to be able to
withdraw from the south of the
Aisne, he has had to use numerous
reserve divisions to prevent Mangin
working to his rear.Leam, as before, is protected on
the west by the St. Gobain forest,
and on the south by the Chemin des
Dames and the difficult country be-
tween them. The French, who re-
frain from trying to take the forest
by frontal attack from the west,
decided to drive to the Chemin des
Dames from the south. Mangin
made the first attempt and suc-
ceeded in taking only a part of the
crest, although his objective was
Leam. Subsequently, Pétain, in a
series of smashing attacks, captured the
whole plateau and threw the Crown
Prince's army into the valley of the
Ailette beyond it and then the cam-
paigning season came to an end, if
the French had been able to ad-
vance northward from the Chemin
des Dames, ten miles they would
have been at Leam on the south and
the St. Gobain forest which protects
it on the west would have been use-
less to them.

ON WIDE FRONTLondon, Sept. 8.—Continuing
their pressure along the front from
Rheims to Ypres, the Allied forces
are pushing back the Germans on
virtually this entire 150-mile line.
Telling progress has been made by
the French and American forces
along the southern part of the front.
The French are before the old Hin-
denburg positions along a consid-
erable stretch in this sector, where
they are closing in upon the bastion
of St. Gobain, the keystone of the
German defensive system in the
west.Farther north the enemy armies
are still in retreat before the French
and British, who are capturing town
after town as they make rapid
strides toward the line from which
the Germans attacked in their off-
ensive of last March. Ham has been
surrounded and French cavalry has
passed through Chauny.
American forces have moved up
along the Aisne line, reaching the
ground immediately south of the
river. The Germans north of the
stream appeared inclined to halt
temporarily, but there seems to be
no question that they will speedily
be forced to resume their rearward
march and not halt again until
their old line at the Chemin des
Dames is reached.Through the continued French
progress on right flank north of the
Aisne, however, even the Chemin
des Dames line seems virtually out-
flanked and the retirement may not
