

HE SHIPPED DEER

Ahead of the Law In Maine

CALAS, Me., Nov. 30.—The shipping of deer from New Brunswick is prohibited in Maine, but a C. P. R. man has found a means of evading the law by shipping deer carcasses with a permit. There was considerable ice running at the time and it tested Mr. Pike's ability to handle a canoe.

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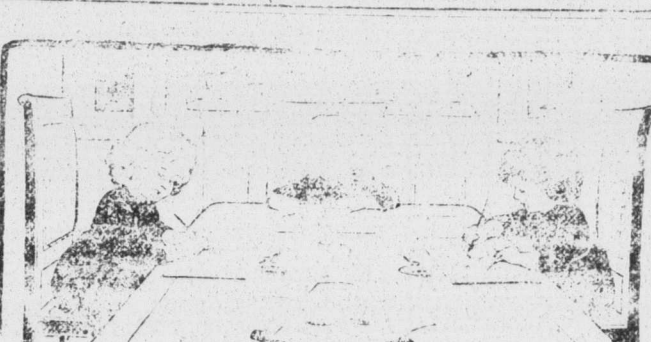
