HANGS HIMSELF.
BUFFALO, NOV. 20.—Unnerved at seeing her father-in-law, Peter Berst, sen., slowly struggling to death in a slip noose he had made for his own neck, Mrs. Frank Berst, of 412 Elm street, ran to call the assistance of her husband. When Frank Berst responded to the call his father had accomplished his purpose, and the rope in his own room.
Peter Berst, the suicide, was 63 years old, and lived on the second story of the building at 412 Elm street, corner of Tupper street. He was a tinsmith.
The circumstances surrounding the suicide give rise to the belief on the part of the authorities that the deed had been carefully prepared his chosen means of death by selecting a long piece of clothes line and nailing it securely to the archedway in his room that led to an alcove in which his bed stood. The rope was wound several times about a large nail and the end fastened securely to the wall in two places to insure success.
So low had the noose on the end of the clothes line been hanging, that when Berst had slipped his neck into it he had to double up his legs from the knees so that he would hang clear from the floor.
Berst had, according to his relatives, been in failing health of late, though his illness was not of a nature that could be defined by the members of his family, nor did it cause any alarm. None of them had any reason to suspect suicide.
