PARIS ACQUITTED FOR FIFTH TIME

St. John, N. B. Oct. 3—John Paris once more was snatched from beneath the shadows of the gallows tonight when the jury in his fifth trial for the murder of Sadie McAulley on August 2, 1921, failed, after being out for eight hours and twenty minutes, to reach an agreement. On motion of the Attorney General, Hon. J. P. Byrne, the poll of the jury was taken and showed that they stood nine for acquittal and three for conviction. The prisoner was remanded to jail to await the decision of the Attorney General as to the next move in the case which has made history in Canadian criminology.

The jury retired five minutes to three this afternoon and at 5.15 signified their readiness to return to the courtroom. They filed into their places and to the question of the clerk: "Gentlemen of the jury, have you reached a verdict?" J. Gordon Likely, the foreman, said: "Sir, we have disagreed." Chief Justice H. A. McKeown said that he was unable to accept a disagreement at present, that they would have to consider longer. He directed the jury that unless they could agree upon a verdict they need not trouble him until he notified them. As it was then apparent that the jury

would be out for some time, His Honor directed that supper be served to them.

At 7.20 the jury again signified their desire to be heard and the court reconvened at 7.45, again reporting a disagreement. They were sent back to continue their deliberations.

As no intimation had been given by the jury that they had agreed upon a verdict, the judge sent for them and they came into court at 11.15, again reporting a disagreement. The foreman said they stood nine for acquittal and three for conviction, and he was sure that there was no possibility of reaching a unanimous verdict. Four ballots had been taken and all had resulted alike. The judge said that he regretted that an agreement had not been reached. He thought under the circumstances that they might be discharged and with this the Attorney General agreed.

And Three For Conviction
Mr. Byrne said that there was a duty on the Crown to demand a poll. Upon its being taken he moved that the prisoner be remanded to jail. After expressing his thanks he discharged the jury and remanded the prisoner to jail. He adjourned the court until Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

At the first trial before Mr. Justice Barry the jury disagreed, standing seven for conviction and five for acquittal. At the second trial before Mr. Justice Chandler the jury disagreed, standing ten for conviction and two for acquittal. At the fifth trial before Chief Justice McKeown the jury disagreed, standing nine for acquittal to three for conviction.

U.S. RAILROADS UNABLE TO HANDLE GRAIN EXPORTS

New York, Oct. 4—The Wall Street Journal publishes a special despatch from Buffalo reporting that diversion of export grain through Canada is being forced by inability of railroads to handle this year's crop by the normal route through the Great Lakes to Buffalo and then to sea-board by barge or rail. About seven hundred cars a day are normally used in this movement at this season. In the week beginning September 25, the railroads were able to place only 150 to 200 cars at the elevators each day with the result that elevators here are about filled. The lake fleet is being delayed in unloading but elevators have been able to handle between 1,000,000 and 1,500,000 bushels a day.

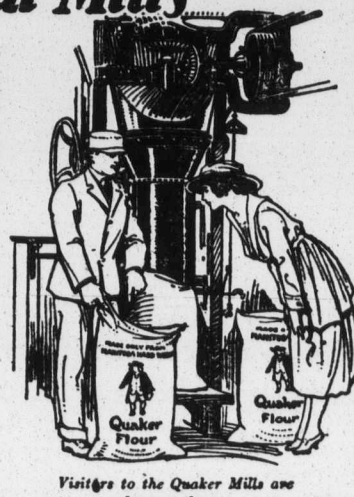

No Blame Attached In Death Of Edgar Smith

Fredericton, N. B. Oct. 4—Coroner D. W. Ross empanelled a jury here tonight to inquire into the death of J. Edgar Smith, who was fatally injured at 1.30 this afternoon when run over by a motor car owned and driven by James Warnock, of Mill-

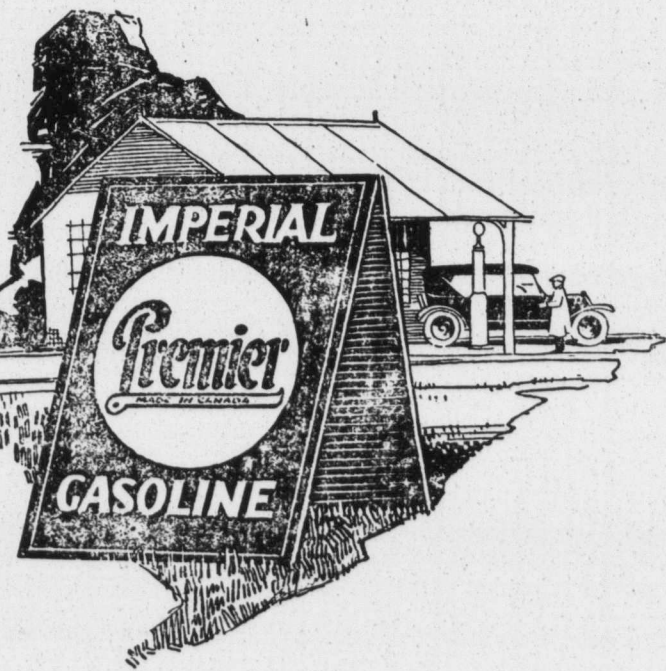
town, N. B. The witnesses examined were John King, Dr. W. H. Irvine, Mr. and Mrs. James Warnock, Thos. Lee and Mrs. Thos. Lee and Miss Annie Lee, of St. Stephen, who were occupants of the motor car. The evidence showed that the victim of the accident attempted to cut the corner turning into Brunswick street, and apparently becoming confused, trying to turn to the left to avoid the collision. The car was travelling slowly. The windshield was broken by one of Mr.

Smith's arms. After being thrown upon the hood, he fell to the street, and the car stopped without going over him, he and the bicycle being thrown between the wheels. The jury, through its foreman, Alex. Murray, brought in a verdict of death by accident, with no blame attaching to the driver of the car.
