There is a tinge of winter in the air, and the country feels gloomy and the thought; yet, at the same time, the darkest days have their moments of sunlight, and winter owns joys 'mid all its snows and frosts and storms. The Old Land.

The electoral contest fast approaching in Great Britain and Ireland bids fair to mark an epoch in the history of the old world, the most momentous of the century.

A widely extended franchise is sure to be the result of the present contest. Men hitherto debarred from giving a voice in the government of the nation are about to be admitted to share in the administration of the House of Commons. The House when chosen will be of a totally different complexion to any other which has hitherto made the laws which rule—wisely or unwisely—the destinies of Imperial England, and swayed the sceptre over Scotland and Ireland.

For Ireland the all-absorbing question is shall she have Home Rule? The majority of the Irish people are distinct in their demand for a local Parliament in the Capital of the country, which simply means nothing more or less than an independent Government, such as our own Canada enjoys—something certainly not so very terrible to contemplate.

Scotland, too, is moving in the right direction, and the fact that she is leaning towards the Home Rule side is a matter of course. Her land laws, in one of the branches which terrify the average English statesman into a panic, are to be reformed, and the Government Home Rule for Scotland, and possibly for Wales.

Why should not all this take place? Under the system which obtains in this country, we manage to get along fairly well. Our own little island possesses her own local Government, but even that is not so good as the Central Government at Ottawa; and so on, just the same with every Province of the Dominion. How, indeed, is it possible for the British Government to be very slow to learn. Either prejudicially or through honesty and efficiency of brains to grapple honestly and efficiently with the necessities of the case, it is surely here to give their reason; and to say that they pretend to see that certain prejudices exist because they are prejudices, and that they are to be maintained, is a matter of course, and one which is not to be wondered at.

And we imagine that Canada affords a very good example to those who wish to work out the problem of Home Rule in Ireland.
