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THE CHINESE DAMAGE CLAIMS TOTAL \$23,000. W. L. Mackenzie King in Calgary en route to Vancouver to Negotiate Settlement of Riot Damage Claims - Speaks of Hindu Immigration.

Calgary May 22 - W. L. Mackenzie King, deputy minister of labor, arrived in Calgary last night, accompanied by his secretary, F. W. Siddons. Today he addressed the Canadian Club luncheon. Speaking to a reporter, Mr. King explained that he was on his way to Vancouver, where, as representative of the Dominion government, he would endeavor to adjust the claims presented by Chinese residents as the result of the riots last fall.

There is a strong feeling against the Chinese in the United States. In fact, the Swedish people in high places are using every possible means to discourage immigration to this country. Their reasons, he states, are that they feel America is taking sufficient toll from immigration to this country. He calls them "the country holds them up until they are of some value to the country."

Concerning Hindu immigration. Asked with regard to the problem of Hindu immigration and the recent agreement arrived at, Mr. King said the fact that the Hindus were recent subjects had been taken fully into consideration. He stated that the Hindus were concerned in anything but a harsh spirit. As a matter of fact, a number of the Washington legation agents in India for private gain.
