Woman's Body Found Floating in Harbor.

Mark Osmond and James Judge, employed making repairs to Baird's wharf, on the South Side, found the body of the late Mrs. Thistle floating in the Harbor about 4.40 p.m. yesterday. It will be remembered that Mrs. Thistle, wife of Mr. William Thistle, of the General Post Office, disappeared last Xmas Eve, and after several days search had been made by her friends and the police the problem of her disappearance was given up as one of the many which will only be solved on the last day.

The general opinion expressed at the time was that the deceased had gone into the water. Duder's wharf would be the most likely place, and several days were spent by the police and others last winter in searching here with jiggers. The workmen who discovered the body saw it floating down with the tide about 50 yards away from the wharf where they were working. They recognized at once that it was a human body and procuring a hook to the woman's garments towed the body to the wharf. The head was almost completely gone as also one of the legs. The two men with the assistance of others who now came to their aid removed the body from the water and placed it on a floating stage used there for repairing schooners. A tarpaulin was procured and put underneath the body and everything was done as reverently as possible under the circumstances. A phone call to the police station resulted in the arriving of Sergt. Olliphant and Constable Lawlor. They came over in Bowring's launch and took charge of the remains of the unfortunate woman and had it brought over to the north side of the Harbor and deposited in the Morgue. Shortly afterwards Mr. Wm. Thistle being apprised of the discovery came to the place and identified the body as that of his deceased wife; he readily recognized the clothing. Undertaker Collier came to the Morgue and put the body in a coffin. The funeral took place this afternoon and was largely attended. Deceased leaves a husband, one son and one daughter to mourn their loss. William Thistle, letter carrier, is not a son of the deceased.

"Capt. John Lewis, of sear, has 1,000 qts. fish, and reports that on his way here, May 30th, from Magdalen Island he passed a derelict south about 12 miles from east point of Magdalen Island two spars about 100 feet out of water. He considers the present position dangerous to navigation."

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Arrangements For Labor Day

The Trades and Labor Council met in the British Hall last night to arrange for this year's Labor Day celebration. The V. P., Mr. N. O'Neill, presided, and the Truckmen's, Longshoremen's, Carpenters', Bricklayers', Masons', Coopers', Tinsmiths', Tailors' and Bakers' Unions were represented. Ten were appointed a committee to arrange for the sports, which may be held at Smithville, and another meeting will be held Tuesday night to determine this. Mr. Maurice Colbert was appointed Chairman, and Mr. A. H. O'Keefe, Secretary of the Labor Day Committee. The day will be celebrated on Wednesday, July 5th. The usual mammoth parade will be held through the city and down the South Side, returning by the Long Bridge to Government House, where an address will be delivered by the President to His Excellency the Governor. Returning to the starting point, both Mayor Ellis and Hon. M. P. Gibbs will address the Union, and both gentlemen will take part in the parade.

Dr. Tait's Lecture.

Yesterday evening Dr. Tait delivered his fifth lecture of the Public Health series. The subject was "The home and its environment." Dr. Tait showed that the selection of a healthy location for a house was more important than most people believed. Damp localities should be avoided, and refuse and decomposing vegetables, etc., should not be allowed to remain in the premises. The lecture will be on the "Physiological system." There will be one more besides this before the course closes, followed by a written and oral examination. Prizes will be then distributed.

Schooner Ashore.

Jas. Baird, Ltd., had a message yesterday from St. Joseph's stating that the schr. Spofford was ashore at Salsman Brook, St. Mary's Bay, and would likely become a total wreck, she being filled with water. The firm did not know if she was fishing or whether she had any cargo on board. She left here a few weeks ago with supplies, and it is not known if these were on board. She was an old vessel, built at Essex, U.S.A., over 50 years ago, and is insured in the Mutual Insurance.
