The male population lived on cayenne pepper and rare beefsteak and practiced shooting at a mark eight hours a day. Every once in a while some foreign potentate would make up his mind to tie Sparta to his chariot wheels and subdue her proud spirit, but he invariably returned home and kicked himself into a state

of sweet somnolence. Along about 480 B. C. Xerxes, king of Persia, became offended at something Sparta had said and decided to annex her in a hostile tone of voice. He accordingly rounded up a neat little army of 2,000,000 men and headed admirals, in fact, have never been on for the Grecian archipelago, which a battleship in their lives. as about in the same place it is now.

At present too little attention aid to the conservation of animal life n the northern country, and reindeers are left to be exploited and diminishd. The reindeer development is in its nfancy, but despite this fact, the erds number 30,000, and with regular reeding it is likely that 20,000 fawns vill be added this season.

"Here is an opportunity for large nvestment of private capital, which would be a profitable money making proposition," says Dr. Grenfell. "The neat of reindeer could be made to add much to the world's supply at a small cost, the animal's milk could be exported and the skins could be made an important factor in the fur market. The skin could also be tanned, creat ing another industry, and used for the making of gloves. Three or four milliens of deer could be maintained with n the bounds of Labrador.

Some Facts About the Royal Iris:

The Royal Irish Constabulary, i ow a much-discussed police force fany people have only a vague ide f its existence and know nothing of its inner working. It is a semi-mil tary force. The rank and file are arm ed with the Lee-Metford rifle, sword avonet, thirty rounds of ammunition

and Webley revolver.

It consists of one inspector-general one deputy, and three assistants. These reside in Dublin, and have the offices in the Castle. From here the whole police force of the thirty-tw ounties is controlled. In addition t the above there are thirty-six count inspectors, whose position sponds to that of chief constable in

There are 196 district inspectors rving under the county various counties, and abou 10,000 head constables, sergeants, act ng-sergeants, and constables. The district inspectors are the lowest com missioned officers, and are comprise of two classes. One class join the of two classes. force by competitive examination a

The force cost the nation over six million dollars annually. The officers salaries—county and district in pectors--and allowances are extreme liberal in comparison with the rank and file. A youth, after passing his examination, is sent to a county district, and commences at \$600 per an This may look small, but then take his allowances, which tot up t more than his pay. 
