McGrath and Godless Schools.

(From To-day's Plaindealer.)

"Let loose the dogs of war? poli-
tically, we mean, seems to be the order
of the day. Editor McGrath, the
mouthpiece of the Premier, is charg-
ing the Opposition with being in fa-
vor of non-sectarian education; and
the Opposition counter-charges by
pointing out that in the ranks of the
Government are some of the most
avowed advocates of Godless schools
—Morison, Piccott and others.

What good is going to be accom-
plished by such a course, we are at a
loss to understand, because so far as
we know, it is not an issue in this
election.

The Premier thinks that McGrath's
mouthpiece, who has been in
every political party, and betrayed
them when it suited him, is going to
throw dust in the eyes of the people
by appeals to the worst passions of
mankind. He is making a mistake.

What the public want is a plain
statement from the Government what
they have done and are going to do—
if those charges of craft and dishonesty
twisted at the members are true.
It is upon matters of this kind the
public want to be enlightened.
McGrath's name politically stands
for everything that is lowest and
basest in our public life, and the less
he is heard of in this campaign the
better for the Government.

Cable News.

SOFIA, To-day.
After eight hours continuous sit-
ting of the Cabinet to-day it was re-
solved that Bulgaria should enter in-
to direct negotiations with Turkey,
as it was believed of no other course
could avert an invasion of Bulgaria
by Ottoman forces. It was felt war
must be avoided at all costs, since
the country is not in a condition to
fight.

THE HAGUE, To-day.
The ceremony of unveiling by An-
drew Carnegie the bust of the late
Sir William Randell Cremer in the
Hall of Justice in the new Peace Pa-
lace was the occasion for a great
demonstration in favor of the peace
movement. Sir Randell Cremer was
the originator of the Nobel Peace
Prize and for thirty-seven years
Secretary of the International Arbitra-
tion League.

NEW YORK, To-day.
Viscount Haldane, the first Lord
High Chancellor of Britain to leave
this country since Cardinal Woolsey
went to France four hundred years
ago, arrived here on the steamship
Lusitania last night. He was enter-
tained at a dinner given on his behalf
by an interview Lord Haldane freely
discussed many questions of the day,
and declared he was in favor of wo-
men suffrage, and prophesied the
millennium of peace was not far off.
He said the relations between Ger-
many and England were never more
cordial, praised intellectual growth
of the States, and predicted Home
Rule for Ireland would soon be an ac-
complished fact.

port.

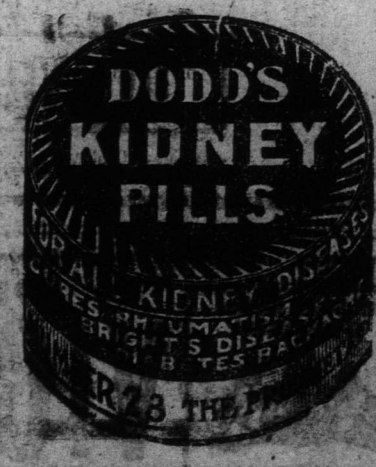
The S. S. Morwenna sailed to-day

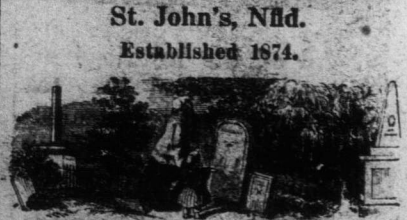
