

His Britannic Majesty's Government find themselves under the neces sity of availing themselves of the power reserved under Article 8 of the International Telegraph Convention and Article 17 of the International Radio-Telegraph Convention to suspend the transmission of telegrams and radio-telegrams to and from or in transit through the United Kingdom and to and from or in transit through all British Possessions and all British Protectorates whatsoever, save and except such telegrams and radio-telegrams as are on the service of His Majesty's Government or of the Government of any British Possession of

With a view, however, to minimiz inconvenience to the public, His Britannic Majesty's Government will, ungrace, permit the transmission of such telegrams and radio-telegrams in plain language as foreign Governments or the public choose to send, provided that such telegrams and radio-telegrams are written in English or French, and an the understanding that they are accepted at the sender's risk and subject to censorship by the British authorities: that is, that they may be stopped, delayed sidered by His Majesty's Governmen in any circumstances whatever.
