

Another Letter from Mr. Warwick

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir, I did not expect that my fusilade of the Prohibition Act would be replied to by such "big guns" as Hon. John Harvey and the famous 'Theobald." Yet neither the former himself a law-maker, nor the latter, nor in fact any one else has dared deny the two points that I have made in my letters, viz.:

1. That the Act discriminates in favor of the rich man and against the poor man. 2. That the Act is full of faults and loopholes.

Their answers to the first point amount to this: "What odds if it Let the rich man keep it if he wants to. The poor man can't get it anyhow, and that's the main thing with us prohibitionists." Theobald adds: "No gentleman would do it." did not say "gentleman," I said "rich man." Are all rich men gentlemen? Are all gentlemen rich?

To the second point they reply: "We shall amend the law." That is if prohibition passes they will con a free hand to make any amendments Girls! Have a Mass it chooses to our Act confirmed by the

people! Now, my contention is, that if the Legislature had simply put the ques-tion and only passed an Act stating how and when the ballot should be taken, it would then have a perfect right to pass a law next session enforcing prohibition. The details of such a law would then, like those of

of the Legislature. The Legislature did not do this. It passed an Act with two purposes in nents for the election; the second was to arrange for what would happen if the electorate replied "Yes" to he question and to define before hand what it would understand the answer "Yes" to mean. Thus the meaning of the question in Section 2 is defined by other sections of the same Act. "Read your context! In other words, the Legislature has said to its master, the people of New foundland, "Here is an Act which am unwilling to enforce without first btaining your consent. If you say

"Yes" this is what I understand you to mean by that reply. We must remember that we are creating a precedent now which may be used against us in the future. The next plebiscite might be on the question of "conscription," or it might be a big contract which the people might be asked to confirm. Would the answer "Yes" to conscription allow the begislature to amend the law after it would be confirmed, and take married men and the only sons of widows if such were omitted from the Act upon which we would be called to vote? What details can be added to a contract without making a difference in its meaning? What guarantee can Mr. Harvey or "Theobald" or even the Prohibition Committee give us that the Legislature, which gives t any person the right to sue an of fender under the Act, will not also give that same person the right to enter your house or mine at any hour of the day or night to search for liquor? There are in the Legislature

or the principle of the Act? In an ordinary election the voters say to the elected candidates, "We appoint you our agents. Do the best you can for us." In this case the agents not only submit a question but also indicate what the answer "Yes" will mean. If a man said 'Yes" to an agent's letter he would not expect the agent to alter one word of his instructions without again re ferring to him. Let us tell ou agents to write out their instructions

This can be done by voting "No." There are many reasons besides why a man may vote "No" with a clear conscience. Some of them are set forth by the Rev. A. G. Bayly, Rural Dean of Bonavista Bay, in an editorial published in the Michaelmas number of "The Mark," and also by a contributor in the same issue. latter asks, "Have we tried all the alternatives?"

If you don't want Prohibition, don't stay away from the polls, but go and vote "No." Remember, a majority of 'No" is sure to win. Don't risk the other side getting forty per cent. You do your best towards getting forty-five! True Temperance will not suffer. There are others besides myself who will do their bit. But we do not go to extremes.

"Theobald's" remark about partridges and fruits being more eahily procured after prohibition is enforced can best be understood by men who, like myself, do not waste their substance in riotous living, and who nevertheless, are unable to indulge in these dainties. Partridges will certainly not breed any faster; nay, the steady hand and sure eyes of the 'sport" of the future will kill them off so rapidly that very soon they will go up in price.
