

GERMANY WILL FIGHT ON THE DEFENSIVE.

PARIS, To-day.

The Kaiser and Von Hindenburg may be expected henceforth to fight defensively, and we must not forget that they will do this on our territory, therefore we cannot expect the German defensive to be of short duration. The Kaiser and Von Hindenberg cannot conquer, but we must be prepared to face the fact that they can prolong the resistance indefinitely, thanks to the passive obedience of the German people and their powerful military organization.
