Well Done Chance Cove.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Mr. Editor,—Please insert the few following lines in your valuable paper.

As present times seem rather serious for the British Nation we must feel that we have a real foe in the German soldier; it has been plainly shown that he is a desperate fighter and we will have to persevere with all our power and might to down him. There has been too much talk about the half-starved, half-clothed, brutal, cowardly soldiers and that we can easily beat them. Yes, far too much of this talk, especially by some of us who understand very little about warfare. My opinion is that most of us should say less on matters that we do not understand.

Even in these critical times we are constantly hearing people say how easily the Allies can win the war. That we need not worry, our armies are strong enough to beat Germany. We have lots of men. Germany can't win.

This sort of talk will never win the war for us. We must realize that we have a real foe to face and that we must down him or he will conquer us. We should see the facts as they really are. Our side of the picture is not a bit too bright at present, but let us hope it will soon be repainted.

In my opinion to win this war it will be the question of which side can hold out longest. I mean which side can be strongest in man-power and has the best means. It may yet be a hard fight, but Right will win in the end.

Lately recruiting has fallen off somewhat, and there is much talk of conscription.

It has been plainly shown that we have the men and now they are wanted; still they won't volunteer. What is to be done? Why, conscription we must expect in some form very soon. But, now, I wish to say that if every other place in Newfoundland would do as well as Chance Cove we would never have conscription mentioned amongst us. Even now conscription won't affect us for some time yet, as every available man here, of age, has offered his services long ago.

This little hamlet, in the bottom of Trinity Bay, has a population of 200 all told—men, women and children—out of that number 20 have offered for King and Country. Is there another place that can make such a proud boast for so small a population? If there is we wish to hear from them. Out of this twenty, twelve passed for active service; two brothers, Albert and William Brace, have paid the supreme sacrifice; while some others have been in hospital and have had narrow escapes. Below I give the names of those who have offered to keep the old flag flying:—

George Brace, Jacob Smith, of Hazel, Archibald Brace, Noah Rowe, Albert Brace, William Brace, Arthur C. Smith, Eleazer Brace, Stephen Smith, Samuel Smith, George Smith, James Clarke, Malcolm Smith, William Clarke, Thomas C. Smith, Adam Clarke, Solomon Smith, Albert Rowe, Jacob Smith, of Jacob; Aubrey Anderson.

From a year or two previous to the war up to the present time these twenty have offered their services.

I think that every one must admit that Chance Cove has done well. We have lots of good men in Newfoundland. Give them good means and they will play their part of the game as well as any. But let us not be led astray by mere talk that we are winning the war fast enough and there is no need to get busy. I think differently; this is a critical time for us when every one should be up and doing; for one thing is certain if we don't conquer Germany we will go under and what will happen next? What? What?

Dear Sir,—With your kind permission I would like to express my opinion on the Daylight Saving Bill introduced by Hon. John Anderson, last year. I quite agree with "Mechanic's" letter in this morning's News. As he rightly says, this bill is a great inconvenience to a large section of our working people, and as far as this country is concerned, it is no benefit as a war measure, because, outside the boys that are across in France and a few other patriotic people, we are doing nothing in the shape of war work. Now, Mr. Editor, why should the Legislature make a law that is an inconvenience to a lot of people? If Mr. Anderson wants to regulate the hours for his employees to work early or late, there is no objection, but when it comes to putting a law on the Statute Book, it is, Sir, quite a different thing. The people should be consulted, not a few, but all of them. If we are fighting for Democracy let us practice what we preach, and consult the people. Hoping, Mr. Editor, that the members of the Legislature will consider this before putting that law in force this summer. We should not encourage, as "Mechanic" says, slackers in fine soft jobs, to shirk their duty to their King and Country, and put working men and women to inconvenience, a great many of whom have sons in the firing line.
