

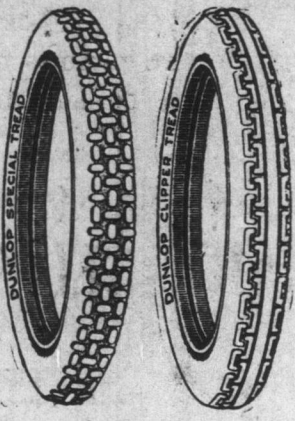
## Von Der Goltz Urging His Men to Return to Germany

BERLIN, Oct. 12.—German-Russian troops under Gen. Von Der Goltz and Col. Avaloff-Bernatoff interfered to oust M. Ulanov, Lithuanian Premier, and take possession of Latvia and then with the assistance of the Baltic Legion, advanced against the Bolsheviks, according to a private letter which has reached here from a German Officer at Mitau. The letter outlines the plan of campaign and tells of the intention of the German troops to obey the Berlin Govt. The German Govt. is apparently genuinely anxious to liquidate the Baltic adventure but lacks sufficient control, and this has

resulted in large quantities of supplies being sent to Courland troops. Orders have been issued suspending all leave of absence throughout Germany for the purpose of preventing any leakage of troops in the direction of the Baltic province. German military action against troops is held to be impracticable because of the general attitude of officers and soldiers. Here General Von Der Goltz is travelling from one army to another urging his men to return to Germany, according to the Tageblatt, which adds that this work takes considerable time because of the distances that must be covered. Germany's new war is featured in this

morning's newspapers, but reports printed here add that nothing of importance to the despatches regarding the Riga situation received by the Canadian Press. Whereabouts of Gen Von. Der Goltz continues to be the subject of contradicting rumors, and estimates of the size of the army commanded by Col. Avaloff Bernatoff also show some divergence. It is recalled that Gen. Count Keller, commander of a large body of soldiers in the Baltic Provinces, which was recruited from German troops left in Courland by the Allies at the time of the armistice, is a Baltic Baron, formerly General in the Russian Army. He has established headquarters at Shavli, while General Von Der Goltz has his headquarters at Mitau. Prince Peter Livan, formerly of the Russian Foreign Office, is superintending the co-operation of forces commanded by these two leaders. The Morning Post, which is pronouncedly anti-German, attacks the British Govt. for having fumbled the whole question. It seems that Poland is in danger of being throttled by the Teutonic grip now tightening on her throat, and says Premier Paderewski's flying visit to London recently was for the purpose of imploring help from Great Britain, which paper hopes will be granted. The Daily News, representing an opposite view from that of the Morning Post, also attacks the Govt. and Allies, declaring the unintelligible chaos into which the East European situation is fast dissolving is a just nemesis of the Allies policy to overthrow Bolshevism with least cost to the Entente Powers. It describes that policy as a mean gamble, dictated by purely interested motives. Interest here is now largely focused in a result obtained from the note which the Supreme Council of the Peace Conference is reported to intend to send to Berlin today demanding withdrawal of German troops from Baltic provinces on pain of coercive measures from the Allies.

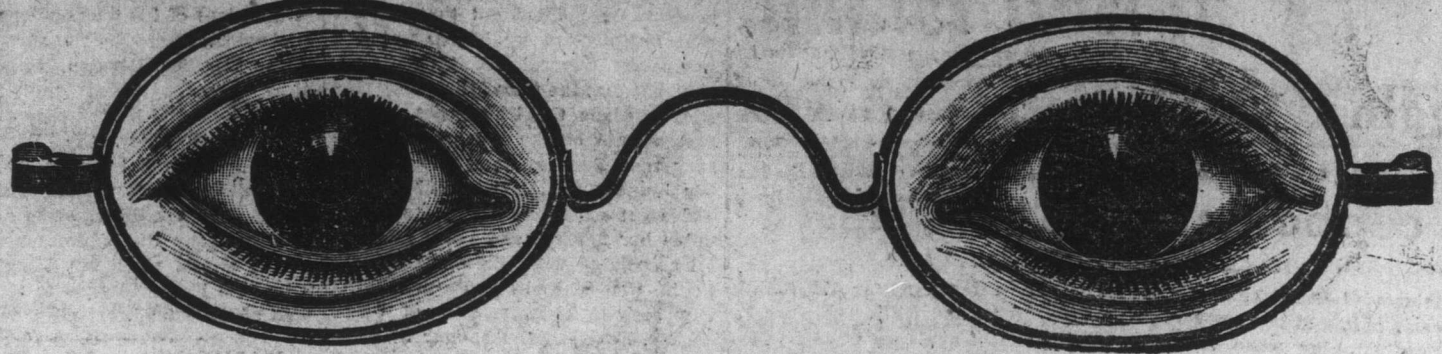
**ELLIOTT CONFIDENT OF VICTORY.**

**COAKER'S INFLUENCE GONE IN BONAVISTA BAY.**

WESLEYVILLE, Oct. 11.—Self and colleagues returned here today after canvassing and speaking on this side of Bay for entire week, including Newtown, Wesleyville, Fair Island and other places. Reception everywhere has been good. And everywhere that Coaker had lost much strength, in some places no party existing. In all others "not half strength", while outside Union circles public sentiment has been completely out of organization. We are assured of a majority of votes in all the settlements. So far have visited half the Bay, and hear good reports from the South Side. A trustworthy correspondent wires from Salvage that the Coakerites were coldly received there on Wednesday night, and that Coaker was very abusive, scandalizing Morne violently as though much angered by his loss of influence. He was at Flat Islands last night. His abstinence did him much harm, as people generally dislike it. His proposition to fix price for fish is not received with favor, as fishermen expect better prices, and suspect he is only scheming to buy fish with his money. It is reported that everywhere Coaker has spoken he has offered to buy the people's fish to get votes, but has named no price, while at Port Union the price being offered is lower than at St. John's.
