During the Interval.

The curtain rang down to-day on the end of Act One of the Legislative drama, and the performers thereof will be given a rest which they doubtless consider they have well earned. It is not prorogation to-day, but adjournment until October, or earlier perhaps, when the House will reassemble to, presumably, consider what will be done with the railway after the expiration of the temporary agreement entered into on Saturday—an agreement by the way to which the signatures of the principals were not attached at the time of its passage, and which may not be completed without them. The playing of Act One took considerable time, consisting mostly of adjournments. Though the scenes could not be witnessed by the great majority of the people, the dialogue has been presented to them, and very edifying and enlightening the spoken parts have, in many cases, proven, especially those bearing on the railway and the revenue. The acting on the Government side was perfect, and if their speaking had been of an equally high order, the applause of the multitude would have been spontaneous instead of sporadic. The country has very little upon which to congratulate itself after the three months' deliberations of a Government, headed by a leader who most vehemently on all occasions testified his uncompromising hostility to the railway company, yet who, when the test came, gave way and literally swallowed his own so oft repeated sentiments. To recapitulate the Legislation enacted at the session now adjourning for some months, would be but waste of time. The people already have epitomised all the acts and are closely scrutinising them to determine just where the popular cause has been benefitted. The task is not an easy one, and will be as difficult as the location of a needle in a bale of hay. Great capital will be made by Government adherents out of the reduction in duties, which after all was but the removal of the Super and Sales taxes on certain articles of fishing necessities, and the remission of the rate on kerosene oil when imported in wooden barrels. But what of that saving to the people when the Government again pledges itself—and through itself the country—to carry the losses on railway operations for the next five months, a loss during the same period last year amounting to nearly a half million dollars. Reducing on duties say three hundred thousand dollars and adding to expenditure five hundred thousand on railway account, means that the difference has to be made up in other ways, and during the interval between adjournment and the reassembling of the House the Government will have to do some figuring in devising

the means by which this sum is to be collected.

Fishery Outfits at Bonavista.

MANY MEN UNABLE TO ENGAGE.

A report to the Collector of Customs from Robert Brown, Sub-Collector, gives the following particulars of fishery outfitting for the district of Bonavista, from Amherst Cove to Cape L'Argent:

Total No. of traps	144
No. of men	418
Hook and line—boats	266
Hook and line—men	729

During 1921 there were 152 traps with 476 men engaged in the fishery, besides 234 boats and 640 men at hook and line fishing. The report of the Sub-Collector says, "I have looked carefully into the condition of the hook and line men and I feel safe in saying that 7 per cent. are not yet able to prosecute the voyage, as they are short of supplies."

South Coast Fishery.

The following fishery reports have been received by the Deputy Minister of Customs from the Customs officers on the South and West Coasts:

In Placentia District, from Placentia to Cape St. Mary's, including places between Colinet Island and Salmonier, Long Harbor to Argentea, 4,650 qts. Burin District, from Port au Bras to Beaulieu, 7,960 qts. Fortune Bay District, from Fortune Bay to Gaultois and Great Jeremie, 14,060 qts. Burgeo & LaFolle, from Rose Blanche to Connore and Red Island, 16,610 qts. In Fortune Bay and Burin Districts the report embraces the Bank fishery as well as the shore catch up to June 10th.

Home's Report.

GOOD FISHING ON CANADIAN LABRADOR.

According to the captain of S. S. Home, which reached Humbermouth at 11 a.m. to-day, fishing is good on the Canadian Labrador, but poor on the Newfoundland side. The ship made all ports of call to Battle Harbor. Many icebergs were seen along the route and these are a menace to navigation passing through the Straits, more especially in foggy weather. Caplin are plentiful at Cape Charles and Battle Harbor. Traps are doing well at Port au Choix and were taking from 8 to 10 qts. daily.

Awaiting Supplies.

So far no arrangements have been made to provide the wherewithal for a number of fishing crews in Conception Bay, who are anxious to get to Labrador. This matter was brought to the notice of the Government a few days ago by Sir Michael Cashin, and the Premier promised to give it attention. There are some 15 crews at Spaniard's Bay and Bishop's Cove who have the necessary gear but cannot get provisions. Several of the men have arrived in the city and are now waiting to see what can be done for them.

Portia Reports Coast Clear.

S.S. Portia left Venison Island yesterday for Indian Tickle and starts on the return trip to-day. The Minister of Shipping is in receipt of a message from the captain of the ship, which states that very little ice was met with on the coast. No heavy ice was seen and only scattered pans were noticed near the shore.

Legislative Council Adjourns.

The Legislative Council met this morning at 10.30 for the purpose of adjournment until October 31st. At 11 a.m. his Excellency the Governor being present Royal assent was given the following Bills:—Sugbury and Military Hospitals, Incomes, Municipal Council, Sales Tax, Revenue, Public Service. In all some 28 Bills passed the House since the session opened in March. Two Bills, the Street Railways and Avalon Telephone Bill did not come from the lower House, where they were held in Select Committee.

PRIME MINISTER DECLARES IT IS SIGNED.

Communicated with on the telephone at 1.20 this morning, the Prime Minister informed the Telegram that the Railway Agreement had been signed during the morning by the Reld Newfoundland Company. The signatures are H. D. Reid, President of the Company and W. Angus Reid, Secretary. In the House this morning, previous to adjournment, Mr. Macdonnell moved an amendment to the motion to adjourn, to the effect that the House should not close until the Agreement had been signed. The Prime Minister then stated that it was to have been signed last night. He left the House and telephoned the solicitors of the contracting parties, and on his return informed the House that the redrafted agreement embodying Sir Michael Cashin's suggestions about the dock, had been submitted to and approved by the Reid and it would probably be signed this evening.

Store Burgled.

THIEF HIDES IN SHOP.

A clever scheme was adopted by a burglar who appeared before Judge Morris this morning charged with the larceny goods from Ayre & Sons, Ltd. Accused hid himself on the top floor of the shop near closing time Friday evening, and when all the clerks had left, possessed himself of a variety of goods from the ladies' men's and general departments. These he placed in a valise which he labelled with a fictitious name. Accused then unbolted the inside door, but became frightened and, leaving the suit case, ran to a window in the back and dropped to the ground, 14 feet below. He was arrested by Head Constable Byrne and made a full confession. Mr. C. J. Fox for the accused stated that it was a first offence. The man's wife was in a delicate state of health and under the circumstances he asked for leniency. Mr. Fred Ayre did not think that a crime of this sort should go unpunished. The Judge concurred, but under the circumstances pointed out by counsel he would give the option of a fine. The accused was ordered to pay \$100 or go to prison for 6 months.
