Mayor Takes Ride.

NEW PASSENGER SERVICE INSTA-
GURATED.

Mayor Cook, the City Councillors, Secretary Mahoney, Solicitor Carter, and representatives of the Press were given a run to Bowring Park yesterday afternoon in Marshall's new Mack Motor Coach. Leaving City Hall at 3.30, the party were taken up Church Hill to Rawlin's Cross thence to the Park by the regular route which the bus will take via Cornwall Avenue, Road de Luxe and Waterford Bridge. Arriving at the Park, a short stop was made, and return to town was by way of Water Street. The party was well pleased with the means of conveyance and on leaving wished Mr. Marshall every success in his new venture.

The coach is entirely covered in, has glass windows at sides and ends and resembles the big motor busses used in England and the States. It will be fitted when completed with comfortable cushion seats, upholstered in rattan, with standard spring backs. The car has also prismatic dome lights for night service. It is also fitted with push buttons so that passengers may ring when they wish to alight. Another feature is the door and entrance. The stop is at the minimum distance from the ground and affords very easy access. The bus, which has accommodation for 28 passengers runs very smoothly and the passenger travels with the utmost comfort. The body of the coach was designed from the same model busses as manufactured by the International Motor Company, New York, and was built here at the local garage by Mr. Llewellyn Pike and reflects much credit on his skill and workmanship. The motor is of 35 H.P.A.C. horsepower, capable of developing a speed of 30 miles per hour, but on the city streets a speed of 10 miles an hour is maintained. The wheels are equipped with Goodyear's giant pneumatic tires, 36 x 6 in the front, and 40 x 8 in the rear. The bus runs on schedule from Rawlin's Cross every afternoon, and starting next week, two trips will be made in the forenoon. Passengers are also taken for intermediate places along the route for a very small charge.

On behalf of our client, Mrs. Emma H. Withers, Executrix of the Will of the late John W. Withers, formerly proprietor and publisher of the "Royal Gazette and Newfoundland Advertiser," we deem it our duty to deny the correctness of the rumor.

The "Royal Gazette" was established in August 1896 as a private concern and was authorized to be published by the Governor of that day, Sir Erasmus Gower, Vice Admiral, etc. It subsequently became the property of the late J. C. Withers, and afterwards became vested in the late J. W. Withers and later in Mrs. Emma H. Withers, the Executrix under his Will. Mrs. Withers has not entered into any agreement for the transfer of her interest in that paper and nobody on her behalf has been authorized to dispose of the said newspaper.
