War Debts Agreement

United States Will Fund Britain's Obligations -- Turks Refuse to Accept Allies List -- French Gain Advantage in Ruhr.

DEBT AGREEMENT FINALIZED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2. The final agreement on details was reached late today on the programme for funding Great Britain's war time debt to the United States, by the United States funding Commission acting with Sir Auckland Geddes, the British Ambassador.

HARDING APPROVES.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2. The arrangements for funding Great Britain's war time debt to the United States were declared at the White House yesterday to be in the opinion of President Harding, "so fortunate and so worth while" that it should be accepted by Congress at the present session. The President is said to believe the terms agreed to by the British Cabinet very acceptable from every standpoint.

POLITICAL VOTE SEEKERS MAY OPPOSE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2. In the face of confident expressions of the Senate and House Republican leaders that the British Debt Funding Bill can be passed this session, signs of serious complications are arising from elements that charge that the arrangement is too favorable to the British and that a promise to stir up a protracted debate in which Congress will no doubt attempt to rouse an anti-British feeling. Moreover the advocates of the soldier's bonus in the House have definitely decided to offer it as an amendment to the funding measure.

DIFFER ON THIRTY POINTS.

LAUSANNE, Feb. 2. A list of some thirty points on which the Turks differ from the Allies, was sent to the Allies today by the Turks in connection with the Peace Treaty which the powers are seeking to con-

clude. Ankara despatches to the Near East Conference still refuse to accept the clause in the Allied draft of the Treaty under which foreign legal counsellors would sit with Turkish magistrates in trials involving foreigners, maintaining that this violates their sovereignty rights. On the question of judicial guarantees a conciliatory mood is being shown by the Allies, and the various delegations appear optimistic tonight that the peace protocol will eventually be signed.

FRENCH POSITION IMPROVES.

DUSSELDORF, Feb. 2. The calling off of the railway strike by the German authorities and obedience by the railwaymen to the request of the authorities that they resume work on all lines where they would not come in contact with armed French soldiers, were the outstanding developments today, in a day that was regarded by observers as having brought forth great improvement in the French position in the Ruhr and Rhineland. The complete stoppage of all export coal and coke into the interior, Germany during the last forty-eight hours, together with the extensions to-day of similar restrictions on shipments of benzol, tar and other mine by-products, were other developments considered of advantage to the French. In addition the French have taken over the handling of food trains consigned to regions traversed by the railroads where strikes are still in effect, and also directed transportation by barges on canals and the Rhine, of sufficient coal for the needs of local populations and industries. Complete cessation of coal production is now a virtually accomplished fact and the inability of the French to send by rail into France coal for reparations account were developments in the situation favoring Germany in her policy of resistance.

An Apologia For Geo. Allan England.

EX-AMERICA SEMPER NOVI ALIQUID.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I have read two articles recently published in "The Evening Telegram" in which you condemn the writings of Geo. Allan England as illusory, false and misrepresentative of Newfoundland. I am in accord with you on the point that Mr. England's writings were too narrow to be truly representative of Newfoundland and Newfoundlanders as a country and as a people. Some of his stories in "The Saturday Evening Post" I found to be correct as far as his description of the average "Sealer" is concerned, and to give the Devil his due, I may say he strove to eulogize the "Sealer" for his characteristic hardness, fearlessness and general make-up, but his outline of prevailing conditions in Newfoundland was illusory in that a reader unfamiliar with the country as it really is, would be led to believe that Newfoundland in its entirety was in a state of privation, its people grossly illiterate and just emerging from their primitive state, which I, as a Native, know to be to the contrary. Your editorial "British Forever," which apparently was written to allay the fears of residents that Newfoundland was to become the 48th American State overnight, simply because Mr. England gave expression to his personal views and convictions, evidently got beyond the control of its author and he simply vented his personal feelings upon the United States instead of Mr. England. The offender, if he may be termed as such, was Mr. England, and the rumor and practicability of annexation of Newfoundland by the United States was of his own making, and if he is to be criticized,

why not confine your criticism to him alone? England, when he went to Newfoundland, did so of his own volition and for his own personal gain and did not carry credentials from Washington and had not the authority of even an "Official Observer" for the U. S., therefore, it would be only common sense diplomacy to keep in sight your perspective and not denounce publicly and slurpingly everything American simply because an individual steps on your toes and that individual happens to be an American. Your comments on the U. S. were anything but complimentary, but it is safe to assume that those comments are not representative of sound-thinking people who have Newfoundland's welfare at heart. America is what you term it: "A Polyglot Union." But it would be well to remember that this "Polyglot Union" is the greatest industrial country in the world and its Treasury has, and still is, saving the situation for many less fortunate countries, for example: Newfoundland's are selling in New York to-day. Quite true, business is business, but why didn't Newfoundland extend this business opportunity to the "Mother Country," but, let's talk reason, the "Mother Country" is too busy endeavoring to effect a moratorium, if not a cancellation, of her war debt to America to bother about floating loans for her colonies. I reiterate that America is a "Polyglot Union" and it is because of her "Polyglot Nature" that America is to-day the richest and most prosperous nation under the sun. The influx of the "Polak, Guinea and Wop, etc.," which you fear so much, if the "impossible" (Annexation by the U.S.) happened, has done wonders for Uncle Sam. The country is well populated and undergoing development and everybody is welcome to come and share good fortune under the Stars and Stripes. You also suggest that next time Mr. England needs literary material he should ruminate in the neighbourhood of the Southern States where lynchings, etc., are common and "colorful." On this point, I'll go you one better. Had Mr. England accompanied the "Black and Tans," his writings would not stand the light of day and would be the truth and nothing else. The saying feature of lynchings in the Southern States is that the "lynched" usually gets his just deserts, but the same is not true for the victims of British lawless lawlessness in Ireland. The idea of annexation of Newfoundland by the United States is unheard of in America, even in official circles, but if Mr. England's prophecy was ever fulfilled, it would be the beginning of a new era for Newfoundland. The writer has not the slightest doubt but that Mr. England was the confidant of many business men in Newfoundland in this respect. Newfoundland in its present state is non-self-supporting and depends almost entirely upon the fishing industry for the livelihood of its people, and Newfoundlanders need not be told the result of a bad fishery. But this deplorable condition will only be remedied when Newfoundland realizes that it

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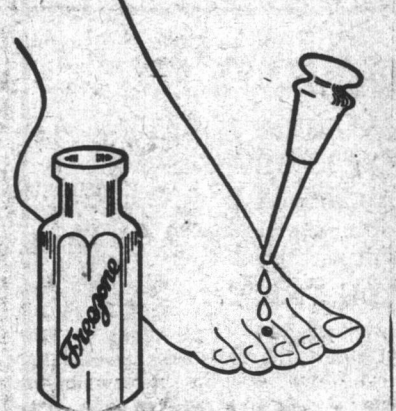
has vast undeveloped resources which hold untold wealth and prosperity for the country at large, i.e., Iron, Ore, Copper, Coal, and Timber. Lack of capital has been the stumbling block for Newfoundland for the past decade or longer and it is hopeless to expect any Government operation of these resources while the country is in such a state of financial chaos. As a result, and thru lack of employment, the future of the country has been jeopardized by the emigration of thousands of its sons to America, the refuge for the non-employed of the world. Annexation by America would be the antidote for all Newfoundland's economical ills. Free trade with the United States would eliminate oppressive import duties and this Government revenue would be not only offset but increased ten-fold by the development of the country by American capital and subsequent exports. In answer to Mr. England's inference that Great Britain does nothing for Newfoundland you say that you don't wish to be "paw-fed" as have been many of the States within the United States. However, if "paw-feeding" can produce "The Nation of Nations," where a man is taken at face value instead of an animal, and where petty creeds and distinctions are vaporized by the warmth of contentment, then by all means let your pride take a tumble.
