

## Municipal Council.

## WEEKLY MEETING.

The regular meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. The Mayor presided and Councillors Messrs. O'Brien, V. L. Colbourne, Colbourne and Dowden were present. Mr. C. E. Hunt, on behalf of King George V. Institute, wrote requesting the City Tax on this building, which is situated on the corner of the city, be removed for several reasons. Amongst them was its use for charitable and patriotic purposes. He stated that a deputation from the Committee of Management would be only too pleased to meet the Council and place before them any information required in this respect. Mr. Hunt is to be heard on this matter before the next meeting of the Council, which will be held on December 1st.

Messrs. Higgins, Hunt and Hunt, acting on instructions from Mr. Lush, notified the Council that through the alteration of the natural drainage of the city, the property of their client, had been seriously damaged. They also stated that in the past the Council employees had, this season of the year, taken necessary precautions to prevent damage during the winter season, and asked that this be done as formerly. The matter was referred to the city engineer.

Mr. E. A. Smith wrote asking certain information for publication in the "Police and Fire Guide," which is now completing. It was ordered that same be given him.

T. H. Carter, for Garrett Brownrigg, complained of damage to property through surface water, etc., from Hotel Street, and also stated his intention to submit claim for compensation at a later date. The Engineer was instructed to inquire into the matter and report.

Permission will be granted F. M. Heary to erect Bill Board on vacant property, Water Street, near Bennett's Brewery.

The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer and on the usual conditions. The Sweeney alterations to dwellings, Portugal Cove Road; Edward Lane, extension to dwelling, Springfield Street.

The Medical Officer of Health reported 15 new cases of Scarlet Fever during the past week.

The attention of the Council was called to the fact that the law prohibiting the use of public streets as a place for the disposal of refuse was being violated, and it was ordered that the section of the Act dealing with this matter, be published.

Attention was also called to the fact that the Weighing Machine which is being erected on the Asylum Road, some 10 feet from the main entrance to Spring Park. Such an erection, it was contended, would be most unhygienic and would be a source of annoyance to the public, and by reason of its being placed in one of the narrow parts of the road, would seriously interfere with both vehicular and pedestrian traffic. A protest has already been forwarded the Department of Public Works, and it is hoped they will arrange to have the machine moved to a less objectionable place.

The condition of the thoroughfare from Water Street to the City Hall was the subject of considerable discussion, and the City Engineer was instructed to have a plan drawn showing the proposed alterations.

The Engineer's report for the week was tabled. It was also noted that many routine matters were discussed, and the accounts for week ordered paid, after which the meeting adjourned.
