The entire summer of 1910 was marked by severe droughts in most of the west. The winter snowfall and spring rains were unusually light, so that with the coming of summer the supply of surface moisture rapidly dried away and an abnormal and steadily increasing number of fires followed. Steady high winds were combined with almost complete failure of the light summer rainfall, and by the middle of August the Forest Service wass training every resource to hold in check the multiplying fires.

A Wireless Agreement

LONDON, Aug. 15-(By Canadian Press)-A "White Paper" giving the text of the agreement between the Postmaster-General and the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company for the construction of a wireless telegraph station on the "beam" system, capable of communication with Canada, and of being extended to South Africa, India and Australia has just been issued.

The company are to complete the station for communication with Canada within 26 weeks of the date on which the sites for the sending and receiving sections are placed at their disposal by the government, and they undertake to have a similar station available in Canada for communication with this country within the same period. The station is to be capable of communication at a speed of 100 five-letter words per minute each way. A "beam" station is one which has an input power of at least 20 kilowatts in the sending station and an aerial in both stations capable of concentrating the emitted waves and focusing the received waves.
