

Prospero From the North

H. S. Prospero, Capt. Field, arrived from the Cook's Hr. Service at 12.30 p.m. after a splendid round trip of 10 days. Fine weather was met with on the entire run, with the exception of yesterday when the ship ran into thick fog. Capt. Field reports the fishery practically over, and the crews are now making preparations to return home. From Orange Bay to Conche and in the vicinity of the Grey Islands the fishing is fair with hook and line, the average being from 4 to 5 qtls. daily. North of Conche the fishing is a blank. Due to winds, fog and much rain the fishermen have been handicapped considerably in the curing of fish. Much of it has been spoiled, and the loss is a heavy one. Capt. Field saw Mr. Waterman, at Paquet, who had just returned from Muford, with 500 qtls. He reports other schooners pretty well fished. The new hospital at Twilligate opened on Thursday last. Col. Orosie a missionary from the States, boarded the ship at St. Anthony to be present at the opening ceremony, but the boat was late in arriving. Two patients were landed there for hospital. Capt. Field reports things booming at Orange Bay. The Rossing plant is now going full swing under Supt. Mr. Dove, of Springdale, and is turning out an average of fifty cords per day. A steamer is expected to arrive there in a few days to take the first shipment. KENNECOTT COPPER CORPORATION.

Has Retired All Its Braden Bonds. Eliminating All Parent and Subsidiary Funded Debt—\$36,000,000 in Cash and Copper After Redemption.

(From Boston News Bureau, Sept. 15) Boston—With little or no help from any rising copper market but because of steadily decreasing costs and increasing cash, the Kennecott Copper Corporation has made marked changes in its financial condition since the first of this year. In addition to the calling for redemption on Nov. 1 next of its \$15,000,000 7 per cent. bonds, it has already retired the remaining bonds of its subsidiary, the Braden Copper Co., amounting to \$10,500,000.

Thus on the first of November the approximately 4,000,000 shares of Kennecott will constitute the sole capital liability of a company that directly and indirectly has capacity for an output of over 600,000,000 pounds of copper annually.

Its Cash Position To-Day.

After retiring its Braden bonds, Kennecott has to-day in cash and copper (virtually all of the latter old) over \$36,000,000, or more than \$9 per share on its stock. Of this, more than \$20,000,000 nestles in the treasury of Kennecott proper, and over 60 per cent. or \$12,000,000, is actual cash.

Therefore, waiving aside for the moment subsidiary cash and without allowing for further copper sales, Kennecott right now has cash in its own banks and in copper inventories the margin of \$5,000,000 over the face value of \$15,000,000 bonds called for redemption next November. This elimination of funded debt has been accomplished by the conversion of large copper production into cash and the utilization of the strong treasuries of constituent companies.

Earning at Rate of \$5.50 a Share.

Although Kennecott issues a report only once a year, its production, including equities in subsidiary, amounted to 250,000,000 pounds of copper in the first six months of the year, or at the rate of about 500,000,000 pounds for 1924. This copper was produced at an average cost under eight cents a pound including all interest charges, selling commission and delivery expenses, but exclusive of depreciation and depletion. In this half-year period net profits after all charges except depreciation and depletion ran at an annual rate of \$5.50 per share on the 4,000,000 shares, or almost double the entire year's dividend of \$3 a share.

Expert Woman Burglar's Record

"Splendid Servant" Who Bolted With Employer's Jewels—Used False Keys—Photograph in Rogues' Gallery Provided Means of Identification.

(Montreal Daily Star.)

A woman who holds the unenviable distinction of being one of the most frequently convicted criminals of her age appeared at Tower Bridge Police Court.

At the age of 38 Mary Elizabeth Robson has received sentence totaling 24 years, and she now receives of 12 months' hard labor.

Housebreaking is one of her specialties. Robson has never been known to use burglar's tools, but usually gains an entrance by means of a duplicate key.

Her favorite method is to obtain a situation as a domestic servant by means of forged references, and to seize an opportunity during her brief residence in the house to take an impression of the front-door key.

"She seemed a splendid servant, and worked so hard," said her last victim, Mrs. Florence Arnold, of Waterloo road, S.E. Robson relieved herself of the necessity of breaking into her employer's house by decamping one Sunday night with \$38 worth of notes and jewellery.

Its Braden is entirely owned, except for directors' qualifying shares; its Utah is almost entirely owned. It indirectly owns 51 p.c. of Nevada Consolidated and Mother Lode, which with steamship lines, railroads and affiliations, makes it the largest copper producer in the world, with the known life of its leading properties extending from 50 to 75 years.

Squaring Away.

It is this record of progress with bright potentialities that cause Kennecott's 4,000,000 shares to sell on about a 6 p.c. basis. Even on 15-cent copper earnings are running at almost double the current dividend and President Stephen Birch says the dividend policy will be regulated solely by the copper market.

Each cent advance in the price of copper on present 80 p.c. capacity operation, means increased profits of \$1 per share on the stock. Given a 14 1/2 or 15 cent copper market for any sustained period and Kennecott will immediately increase dividend payments to its 25,000 stockholders.

With its construction work over, with all its producing units in readiness to meet capacity output of 600,000,000 pounds annually when conditions warrant; with all funded debt eliminated and with cash and cash assets at the highest point in its history Kennecott Copper is beginning now to reap the rewards its progenitors predicted for it.

UNITED STATES STEEL OPERATING ABOUT 58 P.C.

Ingot Output Now Ahead of Pig Iron Production—Most Steel Business in Small Tonnages.

(From Boston News Bureau, Sept. 11) N. Y.—United States Steel Corporation subsidiaries are operating at about 58 per cent. practically same rate as last week. It is expected, however, operations will be increased shortly. Carnegie Steel will probably blow in three or four blast furnaces later in month. Blowing of these furnaces is considered necessary because ingot output is now ahead of pig iron production.

Steel business continues satisfactory, though most of the business is in small tonnages. There is excellent demand for structural, particularly for electrical developments. Among inquiries pending are 4000 tons for a power house in Providence, 2400 for one for Pennsylvania Light & Power, 2400 for Columbus Riverway, Power & Light and 2000 tons for a power plant in West Virginia. Three Chicago inquiries call for 20,000 tons.

Large rail inquiries that came out in last fortnight are still pending. New York Central is likely to close soon on its inquiry for 170,000 tons.

SUGAR.

New York—Sentiment in raw and refined sugar markets continues optimistic. A significant factor is that European countries are consuming all the sugar imports this year. Failure of European beet crop to come up to expectations accounts in a large measure for recent European purchases of Cuban raws and American refined.

Consumption in this country is constantly increasing. Abundant fruit crops and relatively low selling prices of this and other commodities used for canning purposes are expected to make heavy inroads on available sugars this fall.
