

### BEWARE THE DISEASE-EXPECTANT ATTITUDE.

A little knowl-  
edge is some-  
times a danger-  
ous thing, and  
sometimes an un-  
happy thing.  
I doubt if there  
ever was a time  
when the laymen  
knew so much  
about medical matters. And while this  
knowledge often serves as a warn-  
ing of real danger, there are also  
times, I suspect, when it serves as a  
warning of danger that does not ex-  
ist, and causes him a lot of unneces-  
sary unhappiness.

#### She Tries To Forget About Diseases.

A neighbor of mine told me that  
she had sworn off listening to any-  
thing about diseases, because she had  
found that the symptoms stuck in her  
mind and she was always fearing that  
she recognized them in herself or her  
family.

"A friend told me she knew of  
someone who died of the disease that  
comes when you get hold of certain  
kinds of bad olives," she said, "she  
told me she had some kind of facial  
paralysis, and it was really frightful.  
Well, one day after she had eaten two  
olives, Jane told me they didn't taste  
very good and looked at them and  
they didn't look right. Of course I  
was worried about it, and then the  
next day when she began to complain  
about a queer feeling in her throat, I  
was just about crazy. I was sure that  
was the beginning of the end. I suffered  
terrible tortures. It was nothing but a  
little stiff neck, and if I hadn't lis-  
tened to what the woman said, I  
should never have thought of such a  
thing."

#### What Mother Doesn't Know These Fears!

Any mother knows these swift fears  
indeed any human being has ex-  
perienced them whose happiness is

bound up with some existence other  
than his own—and how many does  
that not include? But the woman who  
has too vivid, and yet too limited a  
knowledge of disease and symptoms  
knows them more often and more  
painfully.

A doctor with his greater knowledge  
could check up one symptom with an-  
other, but she cannot thus save her-  
self anxiety.

There are also times when I almost  
wish germs had not been discovered  
and branded as outlaws. True, we  
may save ourselves much disease by  
guarding against them, but do we not  
also invite disease by our worry about  
them, and our nervous efforts to com-  
bat them?

#### She Saw The Germs Crawling.

A woman told me this about the  
time when her little daughter had  
diphtheria. "The nurse used to some-  
times pass from the room where the  
sick child was, to another room to  
eat her meals; and I would take the  
mop and some disinfectant and wash  
the place where she had walked, and  
spray the air. And I was so afraid  
that I wasn't doing it thoroughly  
enough that it was a perfect obsession  
with me. I used to wish I could just  
see those germs so that I would be  
sure to get them all. It got on my  
mind so that one night I dreamed  
that I was mopping up the floor and  
there were all those thousands of  
germs like worms crawling along the  
floor."

It is terrible, this struggle against  
forces that we cannot see, and this  
fear that we have not done all we  
ought to. I can readily imagine a con-  
scientious mother almost driven out  
of her mind by her fear of not having  
done the right thing.

But of course we do need to know  
about the germs and the only thing  
to do is to try to keep our mental  
attitude sane and courageous.

### Stone-Age Flint Found in Kent

What is claimed to be the largest  
individual collection of Stone Age  
worked flints found in England has  
been discovered near Strood by W. H.  
Cook, of Shodland, Kent.

It appears to be the remains of a  
prehistoric "workshop," and is on a  
chalk cliff close to Frindsbury  
Church, within sight of Rochester  
Cathedral.

Mr. Cook found a clue to it when  
walking with another local geologist.  
A private fund was raised, and the

excavation was watched by well-  
known scientists.

"After eight days' digging," Mr.  
Cook told a press representative, "we  
had unearthed some 4,000 flint wea-  
pons and tools.

"All the flints were found in heaps  
about 3 feet high, and there were 17  
separate heaps exactly as they had  
been piled up when the workmen  
knocked off work—possibly 50,000  
years ago.

"Everybody was greatly disappoint-  
ed that no human bones were found.  
"The men who chipped these flints  
were living in Britain when the wool-  
ly rhinoceros and the hairy elephant  
roamed the Medway Valley."

### Empire Preference on July 1st

On and after July 1st all those com-  
modities of Empire production which  
have been selected for preferential  
admission to the United Kingdom will  
be permitted to enter at the lower  
rates, writes the Political Corres-  
pondent.

The preference is applicable to  
dried figs, plums, currants and  
raisins, sugar in various forms, to-  
bacco, and wines.

In addition, Empire silk and ar-  
tificial silk is to receive a preference  
of one-sixth, and those articles tax-  
able under the McKenna duties will  
receive a preference of one-third. The  
latter preference will also apply to  
imported Empire hops and prepara-  
tions made from hops (not beer).

The date, July 1, is laid down as the  
latest date, but it is open to the Chan-  
cellor, in the event of the Finance Bill  
making a rapid passage through the  
House, to change it to the date on  
which the Bill becomes law if this  
were of substantial advantage to the  
Empire.
