New York, April 27th.—The Herald's special, dated Zoula, 18th April, says the very latest reports from Magdals represent that 14,000 native troops had laid down their arms to Napier, and that the King had 500 soldiers killed and 1500 wounded in the late engagement. Advices from Napier's headquarters in Magdals, without date, are also to hand They state that the Europeans lately held captive there, numbering 60 souls, including men, women and children, were already en route to Zoula, for home, and that the entire force of Theodorus' army had either been killed, wounded or taken prisoners.
