LORD MOUNTSTEPHEN

Deeds No Less Than \$2,800,000 to Three Trustees to Keep His Relatives in Fitting Style.

Montreal, Nov. 28.—It is announced that Lord Mountstephen has handed over to three trustees, James W. Sullivan of New York, John Turnbull and Robert Meighen of Montreal, the sum of \$2,800,000 for the benefit of his lordship's relatives.

The following kindred reside in Montreal: Mr. Frank Stephen and his four daughters, Mrs. Robert Meighen and her three children, Mr. Frank Meighen, Miss Margaret Smith Meighen, Mrs. R. W. Redford, Mrs. James A. Cantile and her children, Mr. George S. Cantile, Mr. James A. Cantile, Jr., Lieut. W. Northcote Cantile, Mr. Francis P. Cantile, Mrs. Adams, Mr. William Stephen, Mr. George Stephen and his four sisters, being the children of the late James Stephen; Mrs. G. S. Pelton and six children, Mr. J. C. Covington and five children, Mrs. Stephenson, besides other relatives in England. His lordship's desire is apparently to give his relatives that assistance which is often required by worthy heirs before a testator's death.

Big Fortune Not Touched.

In this handsome gift to relatives Lord Mountstephen did not touch his splendid fortune, which his acquaintances have placed at the way to \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000. They state that Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal and Lord Mountstephen have been very heavy speculators of late in the London stock market, and these noble lords have come out of their fortune deals with profits amounting to between five and six millions. This, therefore, is how these relatives of Lord Mountstephen have so suddenly come into possession of the sum of \$2,800,000.

The three trustees have the power to say who shall get their share in a lump sum and who shall enjoy the interest only, his lordship taking it for granted that some of his relatives might be less prudent than others.

ONTARIO LIVE STOCK SHOW

Opens at Brantford on Nov. 30.—The Programme of Speakers.

Toronto, Nov. 28.—Hon. Sidney Fisher has notified the Minister of Agriculture that he will be present at the Ontario Live Stock Show at Brantford, which opens on Nov. 30 to Dec. 8. He will be accompanied by Hon. F. G. M. Deane, Commissioner of Agriculture, and Hon. H. T. Duffy, Commissioner of Public Works, Quebec.

A public meeting will be held in the Opera House, Brantford, on the evening of the opening day, at which Hon. A. S. Hardy will be chairman and Hon. John Dryden, Hon. Sidney Fisher and Mrs. Hoodless, Hamilton, will address the meeting. The annual meeting of the American Oxford Down Record Association will be held in the G.T.R. reading room, Brantford, on Nov. 30, at 2 p.m., and the American Leicester Breeders' Association convenes Dec. 1 at 7.30 p.m. The Dominion Swine Breeders' Association meets Dec. 8 at 7.30.

BOYS WENT GUNNING.

Fred. McLean Was Fatally Shot by George Mallett's Gun.

Oshawa, Ont., Nov. 28.—A fatal shooting accident occurred at Guy's Point, just west of the harbor, on Saturday morning, resulting in the death of Fred. McLean. It seems that George Mallett and McLean went rabbit shooting. One asked the other to turn round, when their guns struck and Mallett's gun discharged and the charge struck McLean on the left thigh. McLean was removed to a farm house owned by Mr. Schmitt, and Dr. Coburn was summoned, but could do no good. McLean died a few hours later. An inquest is deemed unnecessary.

F. S. Rathbun Dead.

Deseronto, Nov. 28.—Mr. Frederick S. Rathbun, general accountant of the Rathbun Company here, died suddenly while taking his usual morning bath at his residence on Saturday from heart failure. The deceased gentleman was about 45 years of age. Mr. Rathbun married a daughter of the late Hon. John McMurich, who survives him. He leaves two daughters and one son. One daughter is in Leipzig, Germany, and the other is at home, while the son is a student at Trinity College School, Port Hope. Mr. E. W. Rathbun is now the only surviving son of the late H. B. Rathbun, founder of the Rathbun Co. at Deseronto.

J. Torrance, Brakeman, Killed.

Brighton, Ont., Nov. 28.—Another fatal accident happened in this vicinity yesterday, by which John Torrance, a brakeman of York, lost his life. While making a coupling he stood on the north side of the track, next to the platform in front of the fruit houses, and in some unaccountable way was run over between a large refrigerator car and the platform. When found, a minute or so afterwards, life was extinct, the ribs having been broken and forced in against the heart. He leaves a wife and four children.

McGowan Was Jailed.

Erin, Pa., Nov. 28.—When ex-Mayor Magowan of Trenton heard that Governor Hastings had granted a requisition returning him to Ohio he attempted to jump his bail and escape to Canada. He was arrested and taken before Judge Walling, who sent him to jail.

Magowan, Mrs. Barnes and Mrs. Winn's bail has been continued until next Friday. Mrs. Winn is in Toronto. The Edith Beryl Barnes kidnapping case will now be tried in Cleveland.

Banque du Peuple Winding Up.

Montreal, Que., Nov. 28.—At a meeting of the depositors of the Banque du Peuple on Saturday it was agreed to grant the directors an extension of two years to wind up the affairs of the bank, on condition that they should make a deposit of \$185,000 and dispose of the immovable property of the bank as soon as possible. The depositors' decision is subject to the ratification of Parliament.

Canadian Bazaar in London. London, Nov. 28.—The Marchioness of Lansdowne, wife of the Secretary of State for War and former Governor-General of Canada, will open the Canadian bazaar, which is to be held at the residence of Lord Brassey on the 30th inst. The object of the bazaar is to aid the clergy and education fund of the Diocese of Qu'Appelle, in the Northwest Territories.

THE NAPANESE TRIALS.

The Crown Has Now All Its Evidence In—Pare and Holden's Stories of the Crime—The Defence.

Napane, Nov. 28.—During the past week the great trials of Ponton and Mackie, Holden and Pare, for the robbery of the Dominion Bank in this town, has been almost the only topic of conversation and interest. The evidence adduced at the two previous preliminary examinations for the Crown has been thoroughly reiterated, the chief witness being the prisoner Pare, who has been promised his liberty for telling his story of the robbery. Holden, too, the other foreign prisoner, weakened, and he, too, told his story of the famous crime, in many instances corroborating Pare, but swearing at the same time that his fellow prisoner and self-confessed robber of the bank was not to be believed upon oath. The Crown has now shot all its thunderbolts, and counsel will now confine themselves to strengthening the case. Twenty-eight witnesses have already been examined by the Crown, and Mr. Osler has intimated that he would only call ten more. Mr. Osler has decided to drop twelve witnesses, and the case for the Crown will likely be concluded before adjournment to-day.

The defence will then proceed with their witnesses, and it is now said the case will be given to the jury on Friday.

FIVE WERE KILLED.

Disastrous Boiler Explosion on a River Steamer in California—Many Persons Dangerously Injured.

Stockton, Cal., Nov. 28.—The most disastrous river accident in the history of Stockton occurred yesterday near Fourteen Mile Slough, when a part of one of the boilers of the river steamer T. G. Walker, which left San Francisco about 6 o'clock last night, was blown out, killing five and dangerously wounding 11 persons, while probably 16 or 20 more were more or less badly hurt. The T. G. Walker is owned by the California Navigation & Improvement Company, and ran between San Francisco and Stockton.

PRINCIPAL GRANT IS COLLECTING.

Has Been Very Successful for the Sir John Macdonald Chair Fund.

Montreal, Nov. 26.—Principal Grant of Kingston is in the city collecting for a chair of political economy to be named after the Sir John A. Macdonald Chair. The Principal has been very successful and a good part of the required sum of \$10,000 has been secured from friends in both provinces. A prominent Irish-Catholic of Toronto has given \$500.

Kansas Cattle King Missing.

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 28.—Owing from \$6,000,000 to \$9,000,000, Grant G. Gillette, the greatest feeder of cattle in Kansas, has disappeared. His 20,000 cattle ate a fabulous amount of grain. Even his mile of cribs did not hold enough to get the immense herd of cattle into the market. He had paid a big sum for the cattle in the first place. Then he fed them awhile and then mortgaged them to replenish his cribs. His scheme was to borrow these immense sums, put the money into corn, feed the corn to his cattle and finally by the sale of the cattle meet all of his obligations and have a fine profit—a quarter million or so left for himself.

Wilhelmina to Marry.

The Hague, Nov. 26.—The betrothal of the young Queen Wilhelmina, who ascended the Dutch throne in September last, to Prince Willem of Wied, a lieutenant in the Prussian Imperial Guard, will shortly be announced.

Before the bans of this royal marriage are published, the Dutch Government must decide whether Prince William of Wied will become King of Holland, or merely Prince Consort.

The marriage will take place in the spring and will be the occasion for a great pageant.

A Fierous Storm at Halifax.

Halifax, N.S., Nov. 28.—A terrific storm raged here all day yesterday. The telephone service is disorganized. In Dartmouth the whole electric light service was demoralized and the town is in darkness. The telephone service also suffered, and the damage is estimated at between \$8,000 and \$10,000. Police cars are stuck in every direction, and the streets are blocked by wires. A number of hairbreadth escapes are reported. It is feared that many shipping disasters have occurred along the coast.

Fatally Injured by a Street Car.

Winnipeg, Nov. 28.—One of Winnipeg's oldest and best-known citizens, Mr. S. W. Farrell, was struck and probably fatally injured by a street car on Saturday afternoon. He is still alive, but not expected to recover.

A clue in the shape of a blood-stained coat has been found relating to the Stuartburn tragedy. The police know to whom the coat belongs and an arrest may be expected.

Richard Jones Badly Hurt.

Ridgeway, Ont., Nov. 28.—A man named Richard Jones, driving home across the M.C.R. tracks, two miles west of here, on Saturday night was struck by M.C.R. accommodation train and probably fatally injured. His rig was reduced to kindling wood, his leg was broken, face badly cut, and he was also badly injured internally.

Havoc Among the Dorcas.

Lynn, Mass., Nov. 28.—The principal feature of the blizzard here yesterday was the tremendous tide, which, blown by the heavy northeast gale, reached a point that has not been attained since 1911. The sea wall at Humphrey street, built of granite, was almost completely demolished, and 16 or 20 Dorcas were blown ashore and smashed to pieces.

May Mean a Big Strike.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 28.—The coal miners of the Pittsburg district held a convention on Saturday and passed resolutions that a general advance in wages and an eight-hour day be established at the general convention to be held in January. Colonel Hend's imported negroes have promised to join the union.
