

## THE DAYS DOINGS.

Decision Affecting Commercial Travelers—Restriction in Connemara.

CANADIAN.  
The total cost of buildings erected in Winnipeg this year up to date is estimated at \$611,550.

Montreal harbor is now clear of all large craft. The Lachine Canal was partially frozen Monday night.

Monday evening's fire occurred in McClelland's mill at Picton, Ontario, and destroyed the mill.

Loss, about \$2,000.

Mrs. Barlette, the aged mother of S. B. Barlette, M.P., fell at Belleville on Saturday and broke her right hip bone.

Telephone Cuts, the first party from Canada, has left Montreal for Berlin to place himself under the care of Dr. Koch.

Philip Macdonald will write an article for a Philadelphia magazine on "A September Holiday," dealing with a transatlantic trip over the C. P. R.

The new Board of Trade building, Montreal, is to be six stories high, of stone, with a basement. Cost, \$275,000. The exchange hall will have an area of 4,000 square feet.

Rev. S. Claver, B.A., of Dundas, who declined the call to the Central Methodist Church, Woodstock, has accepted an invitation from Paul Street Church, St. Catharines.

The Regina Leader has received an official telegram from Ottawa saying there is no foundation for the report of Commissioner Herchmer's resignation and the appointment of a successor.

Ice is beginning to form on the banks of the St. Lawrence. Steamboats and other vessels arriving at Quebec are covered with ice. Several lakes in the vicinity are reported to be frozen hard.

A registered letter mailed at the St. Roches postoffice and directed to a person in Granby, when it reached the party in Granby, contained only \$70 instead of \$170. The matter is being investigated.

The two remaining daughters of the late Postmaster Dale, of Thorold, were married on Monday last, Miss Maggie, to Mr. A. E. McKen, of Buffalo, and Miss Gladie, to Dr. U. N. Thornton, of Rockford, Ill.

Mr. W. A. McGovern, brother of Mr. John McGovern, roadmaster of the Grand Trunk at Brockville, has been appointed chief dispatcher and divisional superintendent of the Santa Fe Railroad at a salary of \$2,600 a year.

The Osborne-Worwick (Hamilton) Manufacturing Company's difficulties with its creditors have been settled satisfactorily.

Mr. Osborne tendered 20 cents as a basis of settlement. This was accepted, and work was resumed by the company on Saturday morning.

Chief Justice Sir A. A. Dorian at Montreal dismissed a motion asking that commercial travelers be exempt from serving as jurors, observing that, if it were necessary for the traveler to be away during the sitting of the court, it was the duty of his employer to pay the fine of \$10 which the law imposed.

UNITED STATES.  
The run on the Citizens' Bank, New York, is practically over.

The census of Brooklyn taken by the police shows a population of 855,945, against 808,000 by the Government census.

Mrs. Miriam Marston, a widow aged 70 years, living with her unmarried daughter near the State Fair Grounds, White River Junction, Vt., was murdered yesterday.

Thomas Fawcett &amp; Sons, one of the largest coal firms in New York, have signed Monday's liabilities, \$400,000. It is claimed that the assets will exceed this amount at least \$150,000.

Mrs. Charles A. Coombs, wife of the newly-elected Congressman from the third New York district, leaped from a sixth story window in the Pierport Hotel, Brooklyn Heights, Saturday, and was dashed to death. It is supposed her mind was affected by ill-health.

By the explosion of dynamite cartridges at New York Monday two men were killed and two others badly injured. They were all Italians. The men had just finished their dinner and were sitting around a small fire, warming the cartridges, when the latter suddenly exploded. The wounded men will recover.

FOREIGN.  
Gen. Boulanger has returned to the Island of Jersey.

An epidemic of influenza prevails at Fuenkichen, Hungary. One thousand persons are suffering from the disease.

The crew of the steamer Calypso have arrived at Folkestone. The other vessel was a Spanish steamer and it is supposed she also foundered.

The news tells Mr. Parnell that the movement for having him for Ireland cannot be carried to a successful issue if he continues in the leadership of the party.

The Russian Government has forbidden the newspapers to publish a petition drawn up by Ukrainians asking that they be placed on a civil equality with other classes of Russia.

A meeting of Parnellite members of the House of Commons will be held to-day, prior to the opening of the session of the House. Mr. Parnell has summoned every member to be present.

The recent heavy rains and the overflow of the rivers have flooded long stretches of the Manchester ship canal, and in many places the works have been destroyed. Forty-five hundred navies are idle in consequence.

Connemara is beginning to feel the effects of the famine arising from the failure of the potato crops. Thirteen families on the Blake estate have asked the parish priest to point out some means by which they can avoid starvation.

There is a rumor current in London that the Chinese Government is about to raise a loan of \$5,000,000 to purchase silver with a view of providing that vast empire with a native silver coinage, a native mint having recently been opened.

Arrangements have been concluded between the German imperial postoffice authorities and United States Postmaster General for the establishment of postoffices on German mail steamers so as to have the mails sorted while in transit.

Mr. W. A. Ferguson, principal of the public school at Caledon, has been engaged as assistant in the Collegiate Institute at Woodstock.

Mrs. H. D. Lee, who has been for two or three years past the owner of the Fort William Journal, has disposed of the plant and good-will to James McLaren and William Rutledge.

Berlin Young Conservatives have elected the following officers: Honorary president, Sir John Macdonald; president, A. Mueller; vice-president, M. Ross; secretary, K. Knechtel.

The sermon of Rev. Dean Wagner Sunday morning was, like the one delivered on the previous Sunday, directed against mixed marriages, and has caused considerable talk in Windsor.

Mr. Wm. DeKay, of Berlin, has received the news of the death of his son Percival, who was killed by an accident at Huntington, Indiana. The deceased was for some time conductor on the C. P. R.

The school house of section No. 7, Walpole, was burned to the ground the other day. It was undoubtedly caused by an incendiary, and the trustees offer \$50 reward for the conviction of the guilty party.

An M. C. R. express struck a couple of cows in Tilbury, Ont., near the Gracey siding, and the big mogul engine completely severed the head of one and threw the other clear over the telegraph wires and a distance of 200 feet.

Up to the present the Bell Telephone Company has erected, this season, in Canada, no less than 1,350 miles of trunk-line wire, all of copper. The Ridgeway-Toronto line is the longest of the line.

In the will of the late A. D.
