THE CZAR THREATENED. Cracow, Dec. 16.—It is reported the letters. A Nihilist consiracy against the life of his Majesty has been discovered in

Berlin, Dec. 10.-A special dispatch received here from Moscow says that a conspiracy against the life of the Czar has been unearthed here. The dispatch adds that a number of bombs have ben seized, and that several men and women, including a prominent Nihilist leader, have been arrested in connection with the plot.

ACCIDENT TO THE INDIANA. Liverpool, Dec. 16.—While approaching the landing stage here last evening the Philadelphia, collided with the fruit laden steamer Zamora, which was lying at anchor. A NEW IRADE. Constantinople, Dec. 16.—The absence of news from the interior of Asiatic Turkey, and particularly from Zeitoun, is causing much uneasiness among the Armenians and others here. A new irade has been issued in connection with the work of reform in Asiatic Turkey. The insurgents fired a volley into the Spaniards, and then charged them with machetes. The Spaniards made rebels, but were themselves completely crushed. ed away we can look at the field and survey it and see where the Liberal defeat came in. Mr. Gillespie got 106 majority in his own polling division and 88 in his Atherley polling division. Money, though it flowed like water, could not injure him. In the Atherley polling subdivision there are only 70 Catholic votes in all, yet Mr. Gillespie got 88 majority. The Protestants knew him at home, but elsewhere some little religious prejudices existed. the two great factors of his defeat were the Liberal Patrons staying with the Patron candidate, while the Tory Patrons practically deserted their standard-bearer; the other cause of his defeat was the unlimited amount of money put into the contest by the Government supporters and the Foresters. Take Brock, as an example. There are 500 Liberal votes on the list and fully 380 would have been polled, but Mr. Gillespie gets only 110, while Brandon, the Patron, gets the rest, 270, but the only got 404 in Brock all told, hence he only got 134 Tories there as against 270 Liberals. Deficit for the Current and Surplus for the Coming Year.

Restored Prosperity Will Swell the Receipts — Economy Recommended — Currency Propositions.

Washington, Dec. 16.—Secretary of the Treasury Carlisle's annual report on the national finances was sent to Congress today. It shows that the revenues of the Government from all ources during the fiscal year ended in the party at the present time. As sources during the fiscal year ended soon as possible, the lordly visitor June 30, 1895, amounted to \$390,373,268; expenditures during the same period aggregate \$433,178,426, leaving a deficit for the year of \$42,805,223. The revenue for the current fiscal year is estimated at \$431,907,407 and the expenditure at \$448,907,407, which will leave a deficit of \$17,000,000. For the coming fiscal year ending June 30, 1897, the secretary estimates the receipts at \$464,000, 000, and the expenditures at \$457,000, 000, or an estimated surplus of \$7,000,-There is, he says, no reason to 000. doubt the ability of the Government to discharge all its current obligations during the present fiscal year and have a large cash balance at its close, without imposing additional taxation in any form upon the people; but it is urged that the Secretary of the Treasury ought always to have authority to issue and sell short time bonds, bearing a low rate of interest, to supply casual deficiencies in the revenue. With a complete return to the normal business condition of the country, and a proper legislative and executive supervision over expeditures, the revenue laws now in force will, he thinks, yield ample means for the support of the public service, and upon the assumption which seems to be justified that the progress now being made towards Sunderland, Dec. 16-Now that the contest is over and the smoke clearthe restoration of our usual state of prosperity will continue without serious interruption, it is estimated that there will be a surplus in 1897. He advises Congress that further reductions can be made in the expenditures for the Government without impairing

the efficiency of the public service. The Secretary reviews the circumstances which led to the issue of \$65,-000,000 of bonds to replenish the gold reserve, and says that while the prospects of returning prosperity are encouraging, the safety of the existing situation is menaced, and our further progress toward a complete restoration of confidence and prosperity is impeded, but the defects in our currency, law and the doubt and uncertainty still prevailing in the public mind, and especially abroad, concerning the future monetary policy of the Government. Until these defects are remedied and doubts removed, there can be no satisfactory assurance of immunity from periodical disturbance. He advocates the retirement of the "greenback" and of United States Treasury, notes, and that the Government be wholly relieved from the responsibility of providing a credit currency for the people. With or without a surplus revenue, the Government can now procure gold only by negotiating loans or by making purchases under the statute, and this state of affairs, which is the natural result of causes still operative, is almost certain to continue until the causes themselves are removed. This can most successfully, and economically be accomplished by authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to issue from time to time bonds payable in gold, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding 3 per cent per annum and having a long time to run, and to exchange the bonds for United States notes and treasury notes upon such terms as may be most advantageous to the Government. or to sell them abroad for gold whenever in his judgment it is advisable to do so, and use the gold thus obtained in redeem-

ing the outstanding notes. THE PELAGIC FISHERIES. The report shows that the Bering Sea patrol fleet during the last season boarded and examined 94 vessels. 54 of which were engaged in sealing. The catch of seals at sea in the award area during the last season was 56,291. as compared with 61,830 for the season of Careful count of all the seals on the islands last year makes the numbr a little over 200,000, a decrease of over half since 1891. The Secretary devotes a large share of his report to a discussion of the condition of the Treasury and the currency, in the course of which he makes an exhaustive argument in favor of the retirement of the greenbacks.
