—Mr. J. M. McEvoy, acting for the relatives of the murdered Wm. A. Hendershot, St. Thomas, failed, before the Court of Appeal, Toronto, yesterday, to secure judgment against the Covenant Mutual for the \$5,000 of insurance placed on Hendershot by his uncle, the man who assisted in his murder. The policy was taken out by the uncle, who was trustee of it, and the court held that, as he was the moving spirit in procuring the insurance, the policy was void, as it was a part of a conspiracy to rob the company, after robbing the insured of his life. Mr. Osier, who appeared for the company, was not called upon.
—Justice MacMahon, who presided over the murder trial of Hendershot and Weller, with Mr. Justice Rose and Justice MacMahon heard the argument.
—The London Presbyterian Council held a special meeting in the schoolhouse of St. James' Church last night for the organization of the Waterloo Street South congregation. The president, Rev. M. P. Talling, presided, and Mr. G. W. Armstrong acted as secretary. There was a large attendance of members. The election of council officers for the year resulted as follows: Mr. Thomas Alexander, president; Rev. Thomas Wilson, vice-president; Mr. G. W. Armstrong, secretary and Mr. John Macpherson, treasurer. After a lengthy discussion the council passed resolutions approving of the organization of the Waterloo mission into an augmented congregation, and asking the boards of management of the various city churches to render it financial aid.
—Samuel Blanning, one of the oldest and most trusted employees of the Grand Trunk at Windsor, died suddenly on Sunday of heart disease. He was born at Bristol, England, 64 years ago, and when 19 years old married a bride of 16. He came to this country when still in his minority, and engaged with the Grand Trunk in this city in 1854. Then he went back to England, but afterwards returned and settled in Windsor, where he has resided for 35 years. He served six years in the Essex County Council, and was deputy mayor, and was a like period in the Windsor City Council. When he retired from public life the City Council presented him with a silver service. He belonged to the Masonic Order, the Knights of Pythias and the Oddfellows, and the flags over the halls of these orders, the City Hall and the Grand Trunk workshops are flying at half-mast. He leaves a widow, a niece, Mrs. Alice Egan, of Detroit, and an adopted son, Charles Blanning Findlay.

Is She a Bigamist?
A Dunwich Man Claims That His Wife Has Two Husbands.

And That He Is Not No. 1—Hence a Law Suit.
St. Thomas, March 2.—An examination was held yesterday before County Court Clerk McLaws, in an action entered by Mrs. Mary Page, of the township of Dunwich, against her husband, Joseph Page, of that township, for alimony, damages for non-support and maintenance. The case will be heard before a jury at the next assizes.
The plaintiff ten years ago married a man named James Hugheson. Hugheson deserted her, and made no provision for the support of their two children. After he had been absent so long that she thought him dead, she married Page last September, and the latter now brings her previous marriage as a reason for his failure to contribute to her support.

A Charge Against the Rising Generation in Canada.
The Responsibility of Parents for Good Behavior.

Recently letters have appeared in several of the best British papers reflecting on the future of Canada and on the manners of our homes, our children and our youth. Credit is given by all the writers to our excellent climate, rich mineral deposits, unrivaled farming lands and many other of our distinctive features; but the criticisms on our every-day life are severe even where the writers evidently desire to be friendly. Now, the question arises, Do we deserve these criticisms? Candidly we must admit that some of them are correct. The fact is that we are, as pointed out in a recent issue, copying too much from our neighbors, and like them we are unthinkingly laying the foundations of future trouble for Canada.
In the spirit which should animate every patriot, we desire to look our faults fairly and squarely in the face and endeavor to seek a remedy. We are perhaps better than our critics, but that fact does not alter the conditions of our case. What we see in our young people of today is the result of what the older people taught them, and if there is amongst our young men and women a levity akin to evil, if lack of veneration for truth and righteousness, if want of respect for parents and chafing under parental control be distinguishing features of the young of today, then a grave failure of duty lies at the doors of their elders.
For our own part we are frank and honest enough to admit and regret the failure of too many parents to train their children properly. It is a painful matter to thoughtful people to see how the aim of many fathers and mothers is to show off their children as "smart" rather than good; and the pride of some parents is to see how quickly their boys and girls can ape the ways of men and women. In schools there is far too much namby-pamby sentiment about punishing pupils, especially boys, for offenses against the rules of school honor and school decency, and the training is more of a cramming of a score of different lessons rather than a training for the serious business of life.
Canadians should pause right here and now, and see to it that their children are trained at home and at school in the paths of honor and virtue, and that to retain the ways of boyhood and girlhood as long as possible is to pave the way for an honorable life old age. Above all, let us remember that no country can remain free and progressive which does not continue to train its children in the paths of truth and righteousness.
